be held at Cleveland, Ohio, next year. It is planned to ask the state for an appropriation of \$10,000 to aid in financing the exhibit. Lamb of Portland.

The annual meeting of the board of directors of the Pacific Egg Producers will be held in Seattle February 14th. Ambrose Brownell of Milwaukie and Manager G. C. Keeney represent the Pacific Poultry Producers Co-op on this board.

Letters, poems and bits of paper were found in old trunks at the home of John Simpson at Amity, Oregon, recently. Some of the items date back to 1828. This crumpled mass of old papers was taken to McMinnville to be straightened and assembled. It was the Abraham Bolejack collection of old letters, notes, etc., and in the bunch was a receipt written in Surry county, North Carolina, as follows: "September 15, 1845—Received of Abraham Bolejack his bond for four months after date, for a negro girl named Any, aged 14 years. Sold as the property of the estate of Samuel Bolejack, deceased. (Signed) Elisha Bannon, Administrator." This slave girl was brought to Lone Jack, Missouri, when Abraham Bolejack left North Carolina. There was a list of 14 slaves, with prices ranging from \$185 to \$575, the value of the total number was \$4,900. About 85 years ago some time in Missouri left for the Oregon country and settled in Yamhill and Polk counties, having interests in both.
