The natural result is the so-called recession and the federal debt advanced \$37,633,792.00 (some headache). Why have all these vast expenditure failed? . . . Simply because this army of unfortunates have no buying power beyond the bare necessities; no money with which to buy manufactured goods."

Mrs. Winnard claims a pension at \$60 or even \$100 is not enough to do the good desired and that we are liable to have an endless chain of depression unless something is done about it and soon. With an adequate pension system in force wheels of industry will move normally and much better than has been the case in many years. Well, Mrs. Winnard has for many years made a study of economics and is clever on statistics and knows a lot about industrial setups in our country. Perhaps, in a few words we might learn just how easy it is going to be to finance this great pension proposition . . . certainly we cannot have reason to complain if business would be greatly improved and every human made happier.

Heard lot of people talking about pensions and it looks just as though they'd have to get their pensions before they can see any outlet. Mrs. F. W. Winnard, well known resident of Hillsdale, often gets articles accepted for publication on various subjects and here is part of one of them recently published in a Portland daily paper.

"Sometimes in amazement, more often amusement, I listened to discussions or read letters from the people in regard to pension plans. In a family letter from Salem the theory was advanced that a \$60 pension to those over sixty, the fund to be financed by a two per cent gross income tax, would absorb unemployment. If that didn't turn the trick, just lower the age limit until it did.

The head of the nation has been operating on that theory for five years. Hundreds of thousands of CCC boys, removed from productive labor and given \$30 per month, room and board—millions on a pension ranging from \$10 to \$30 per month, (whatever sum they do receive is

The gravity of the pedestrian traffic problem in Oregon, illustrated in the accompanying chart, is emphasized by the fact that of 22 persons who have lost their lives in Oregon traffic accidents so far this year, 16 have been pedestrians, according to

Secretary of State Earl Snell. "Our campaign for reducing highway deaths can succeed fully only if pedestrians can be made to realize the tremendous hazard that exists, and the important part they must play in safe movement of traffic," Secretary Snell declared.

Opposition to creation of the proposed Seven County District can be effective only by taking the time necessary to visit the polls on April 8th.

If the Seven County District is formed, the Bonneville Administrator will not construct any distribution lines to carry Bonneville energy to the consumers. All such distribution systems must be built or purchased by the utility district.

Power of the Bonneville Administrator is limited to selling the output of Bonneville at wholesale only.

The Federal Government may build high voltage transmission lines to various districts for sale of energy at wholesale only.

As indicative of the burden to which your property may be subjected, note the following provisions of the law under which public utility districts may be formed:

"The People's Utility District herein provided for shall have power . . . to borrow money and incur indebtedness, to issue, sell and assume evidences of indebtedness, etc.

"To levy and collect, or cause to be levied and collected, subject to constitutional limitations, taxes for the purpose of carrying on the operations and paying the obligations of the district."

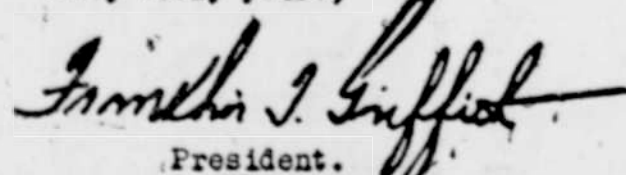
Without a vote of the people the directors would have power to incur indebtedness not exceeding the gross annual revenue of the district, estimated by the Hydro Electric Commission at more than \$2,000,000.

With voters' approval the directors, under the law, may issue general lien bonds on all property in the district not exceeding 10% of the assessed valuation of the property therein. This, at present, means a possible bonding power of \$10,000,000.

Do not be misled. Avoid higher taxes and more bonded debt.
