Governor Martin Issues Proclamation

Governor Martin of Oregon has issued a proclamation officially designating the week beginning April 25th as Accident and Health Insurance Week in the State. He says:

To the end that we may reduce the number of preventable accidents and illnesses, I appeal to every good citizen of Oregon to join the nation-wide observance of Accident and Health Insurance Week beginning the 25th of April.

I also enjoin our good citizens not to neglect any signs of ill health, to guard their own physical welfare so as to eliminate as nearly as possible physical disabilities.

Accidents were responsible for approximately 106,000 deaths during 1937. In addition to the terrific death toll, accidents permanently disabled about 375,000 persons and caused approximately 9,400,000 temporary disabling injuries.

With these startling statistics confronting us shouldn't our thoughts turn to the increase in our expenses that are brought on by disability due to accidents? The added expenses of doctor bills, hospital bills, nurses' bills, etc. are ordinarily not provided for in our budgets.

To preserve the security of their families and their own in times of distress resulting from accidents and illnesses, I also urge everyone to protect their earning power by adequate insurance.

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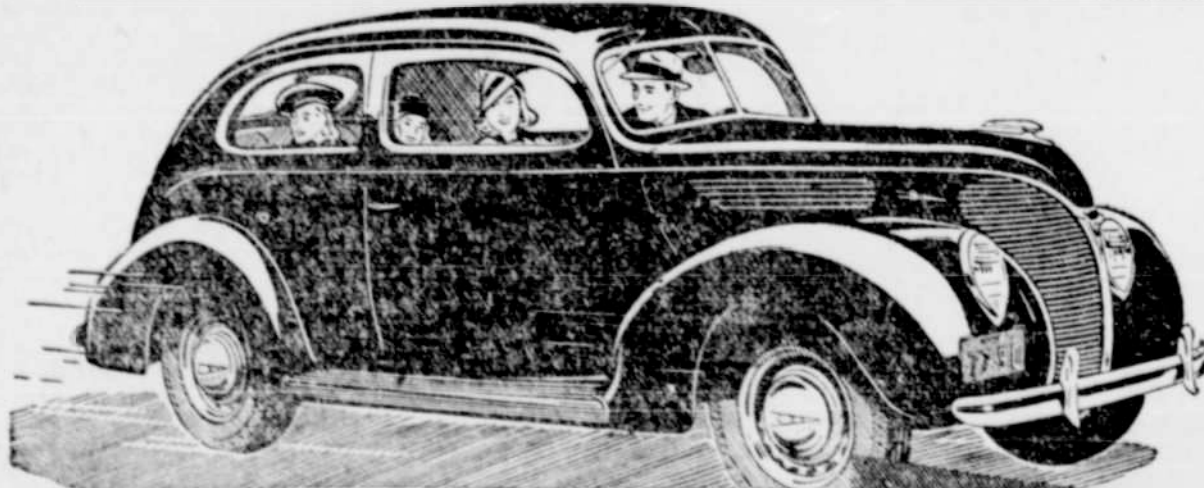
