Jacob Kemmer county commissioner candidate makes following statement: "I am a Republican, and have been a resident of Washington county all my life. I live four miles south of Aloha, on Beaverton route 1, on Cooper Mountain. I believe that the tax payers should be and still are the governing body. Very often we have been misled. We are continuously confronted with new problems, one of the chief of which, in my estimation is that of Rural Homesites. These homes are quite numerous in our county and are steadily increasing. I believe their progress should not be retarded by lack of roads. I would be in favor of additional improvements. If the general county levy will not take care of these improvements, the movement should have the cooperation of the county court to levy an additional tax within the boundaries of such localities for the improvements designated by them. I do not wish to confuse the voter with the idea that I favor going back to the district system. That would be taking several steps backward. I am a firm believer in a balanced budget in cooperation with the county's taxpayers. We should get our just share of taxes collected by our state governing body in Washington county, and to accomplish this we must have the cooperation of all taxpayers with the county and state governing bodies."

"Rose of Jericho" Plant Native of Sandy Deserts

The rose of Jericho or Resurrection plant is not mentioned in the Bible, though one of the books of the Apocrypha speaks of the "rose-plant in Jericho." The Standard Bible dictionary says this may possibly be the real rose, which was first introduced in Palestine probably during the Persian or Greek era, but the Syriac translation reads instead the Oleander.

What is called today "rose of Jericho" is a very homely crucifer, an Anastatica hieracuntina, says a writer in the Detroit News, which in a moist atmosphere opens the petals of its corona and in a dry atmosphere closes them. This plant is a native of the sandy deserts from Arabia and Syria to Algeria, is an annual and grows about six inches high. Soon after flowering the leaves fall off and the branches roll up into a ball that looks like wickerwork, and that contains the seeds or fruit. The plants are uprooted by the wind and blown over the desert. When the rains descend, the branches open back and the seeds germinate. There are other species of plants known also as resurrection plants because of this faculty of "coming to life" when the dried leaves, branches or fruits are moistened.

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Henry Longfellow, Poet, Once Harvard Professor

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was affectionately called the "Children's Poet." The author of "Hiawatha," "The Courtship of Miles Standish" and "Evangeline," with many others, he was considered the outstanding American poet of his day and still holds a prominent place in the literary world, writes a correspondent in the Washington Star.

Longfellow, a New Englander, was a teacher as well as a writer, but he eventually retired from a professorship at Harvard to devote his whole attention to poetry.

His literary career began early. As a boy his prose and verse were published and he once confided in his father that he "aspired after future eminence in literature."

History records how well this ambition was to be realized. Regarded as a national hero by the public, his home in the famous Craighouse was usually filled with autograph hunters, and all his life honors were heaped upon him.

As popular in England as he was in his own country, Longfellow received honorary degrees from the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge. After his death in 1882, England honored him still further by placing his bust in Westminster abbey—the first memorial of its kind erected to an American poet.

Seedless Fruits

The Spaniards planted orange trees in Brazil at an early date, but it was not until about the year 1829 that there appeared near the village of Bahia, Brazil, a form of seedless navel orange, since known as the Bahia navel. The first trees of this kind in the United States were sent from Brazil to the government propagating grounds in Washington, D. C., in 1870. The cause of the freakish development of the navel orange is unknown. Under scientific breeding, the improved fruit has been produced. The production of the seedless varieties of grape is the result of centuries of development by growers, through grafting, cross-fertilization, selection, etc. These seedless fruits are propagated by the means of bud grafting instead of by seeds.
