

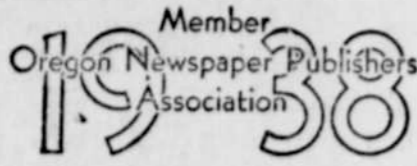

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## AGREED THAT HENRY FORD WAS RIGHT

In the midst of the last depression Henry Ford made the profound remark that "there is no such thing as overproduction." It was a startling contradiction of the general assumption at the time that overproduction was the cause of the depression. Now that depression has caught up with us again this same overproduction fallacy is being trotted forth to account for it and most assiduously, by the administration.

The idea seems to be that production and purchasing power, instead of being synonymous, are somewhat in conflict, and that if we give the wage earner and the farmer more money for less work and sweat the taxpayer to provide incomes for the unemployed, recovery is at hand.

Excessive labor cost is, of course, another term for overproduction. So it is evident that a major cause of the present depression was not overproduction but underproduction, not underpayment but overpayment of the wage earner, and it is a major reason why the depression continues.

Every disinterested economist is aware that an equitable distribution of the national income is essential to stable prosperity, and that another essential is the health and happiness of the working population, which means a fair degree of leisure. But we have yet to find one who believes with the administration that wage and hour rates which choke industry and restrict production are the answer or that any good can come from priming a pump thus frozen. Henry Ford was everlastingly right.

## I. H. Van Winkle Candidate for Supreme Court Judge

"I am a candidate to fill the vacancy in the Supreme Court caused by the death of Judge Campbell last year, and now held by appointment by the Governor until filled at the next general election."

"I am now completing eighteen years as attorney-general of Oregon following many years as assistant in that office. This position has given me wide experience in construing the status and constitutional provisions of the State and the United States, and has required a thorough familiarity with the law and procedure in the courts. The questions considered in the legal opinions and oral advice of this office include practically the entire field covered in the duties of a Supreme judge. The in-

terpretation involved in such questions requires the exercise of judgment for their solution similar to that of the court. My opinions upon such questions very rarely have been reversed by the courts.

"My duties as attorney-general have also required me to represent the State in a very large number of cases in all of the state and Federal courts including the United States Supreme Court, many of them of great importance. The experience cannot be otherwise than most helpful in the discharge of the duties of the office to which I aspire.

"I was born and reared on a farm near Halsey in Linn County, Oregon, and I am a graduate of Willamette University, in both the Colleges of Law and Liberal Arts, having earned my own way while a student there. I was for many years an instructor in the College of Law of Willamette, in addition to the active practice of my profession and was Dean of that College from 1913 to 1927, and am now Dean Emeritus.

"I have vigorously, but fairly, enforced the criminal laws when assigned to such duty by the order of the Governor, as provided by law, in cases where the local law enforcement agencies have been inadequate, or, for any reason, prevented from acting efficiently. I procured the enactment of the law requiring payment of royalties for the taking of sand and gravel from navigable streams, resulting in the increase of the common school fund by over half a million dollars up to now, without increasing taxation on property, and such income will continue indefinitely. I secured title to more than 20,000 acres of land for the common school fund.

"I materially aided in the enactment of the laws providing for soldier's bonus and loans and successfully defended them when attacked in court. I have always construed such laws so the veterans could receive the benefits intended for them, also the fish and game laws granting special privileges to veterans. I wrote the original law granting veterans and their widows exemption from taxation of their homesteads, or other property selected, to the value of \$1,000 and have always construed such statutes liberally.

## Berry Boxes Changed To meet California Law

The standard berry hallock of Oregon will probably undergo minor changes in construction this year in order to permit its use on the California market, officials of the State Department of Agriculture announced.

The change was made necessary when California weights and measures officials warned Oregon growers that last year's standard container would not be permitted on the southern market this season. State Department of Agriculture officials protested the action and were later informed that minor changes in the construction of the boxes would permit their use.

The standard Oregon hallock was made with a raised bottom, local agricultural officials say, and with the four sides extending three-quarters of an inch below the bottom. The basis of the California complaint was that this construction seemed to "facilitate the perpetration of deception or fraud."

California officials have indicated that the raised-bottom box will be legal if two of the sides are cut out or perforated up to the level of the bottom of the box.

As a result of this circumstance, State Department of Agriculture officials contacted berry boxes manufacturers in order to have them change their specifications in line with the California recommendations.

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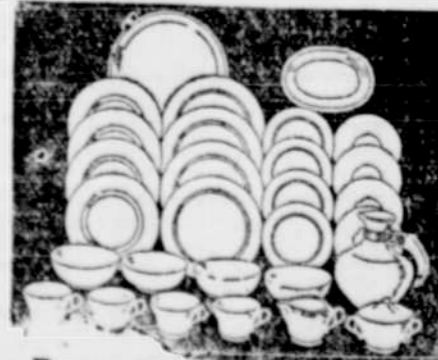
