T. McNary Weed Candidate For Republican Nomination

T. McNary Weed, candidate for the Republican nomination for short term United States Senator, is the only candidate of that party for either the short or long term living outside of Portland and Multnomah county.

If nominated and elected, this candidate promises to attend any special session of Congress and vote for the

best interests of Oregon. Although some voters may consider the short term senatorship as being only a joker, Weed believes that many of the same voters are of the opinion that after six years of the New Deal, the country needs an entire New Deal. Weed, however, is not a rabid anti-New Dealer, for he believes that many of the beneficial reforms—such as those which concern banking and the stock market—instituted by the present administration should be retained in whole or in part. In other words, the wholesome grain should be separated from the useless chaff.

Weed is an attorney magazine writer and horticulturist. He has resided all but four years of his life at Beaverton in Washington county. He attended grade and high schools in that town; attended the Oregon State Agricultural College in Benton county for four years, receiving a B. S. degree and attended the Northwestern College of Law, a night school, for four years, receiving an LL. B. degree.

In 1928 with his father, Howard Weed, he established the National Iris Gardens, a horticultural firm devoted to the growing of perennial flowering plants and bulbs. More than 3,000 shipments are made each year by parcel post and express to customers residing in other states than Oregon and to foreign countries. This concern is the largest user of the Beaverton post office, causing it to be raised from third to second class ranking. Many of the plants shipped by Weed are grown in specially suitable soils in Marion, Clatsop and Clackamas counties.

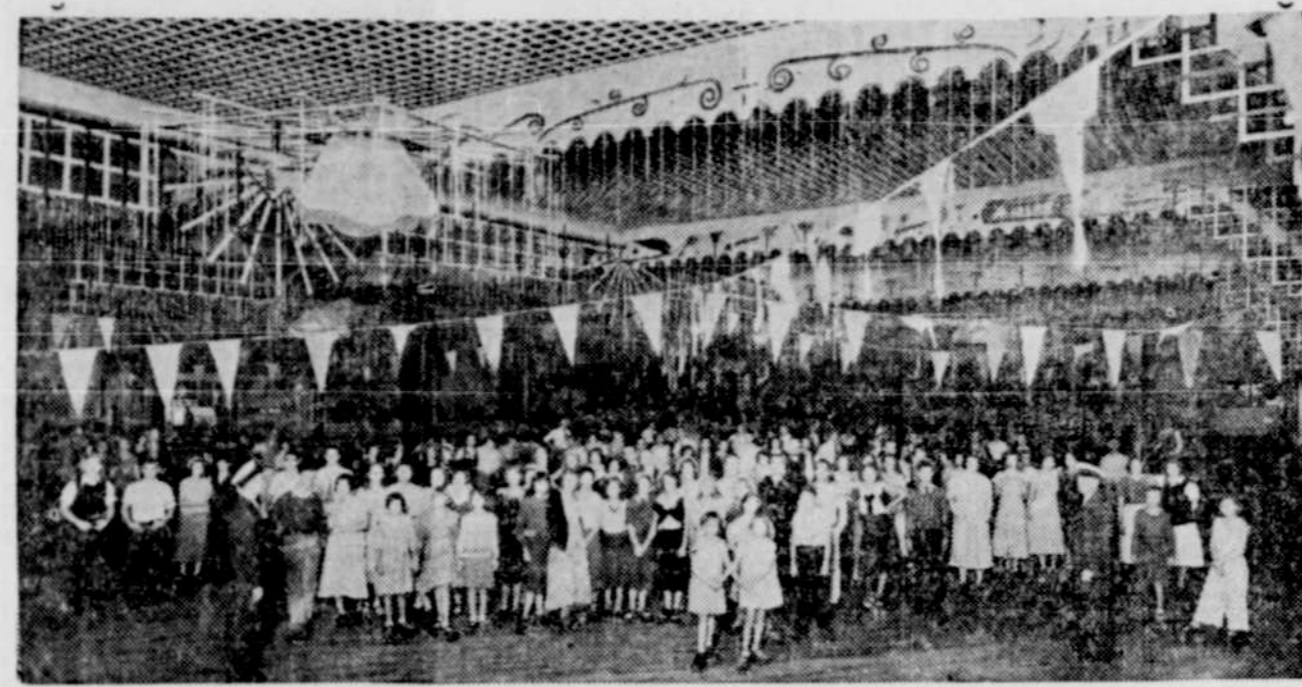
During recent years, Weed has been a regular contributor of articles to a score of leading national magazines such as The American Home, Reader's Digest, Sunset, Better Homes & Gardens, Commonwealth, Modern Psychologist, Country Life, and others. One of his articles appears in the current issue of The Country Gentleman. His writings also have been published in newspapers such as The New York Times, Birmingham Herald, and Oregon Journal. At request of station managers, he has broadcast a number of horticultural talks over KOIN and KOAC.

Beaverton City Council Order New Equipment

The Beaverton City Council met Monday, May 2, and authorized purchase of a Wier grader at \$200 to be delivered in Beaverton, 300 feet of 2 1/2 inch fire hose from the League of Oregon Cities; two smoke masks, for the fire department; two ammonia gas mask, one 1 1/2 inch fox nozzle (spray) for close up fighting. Each month money is transferred to the various sinking funds, namely water system depreciation account, water bond sinking fund and improvement bond sinking fund.

It is hoped that the city of Beaverton will be completely out of debt in 8 or 9 years.

After each meeting a copy of the records is given each member of the council for his own reference. This innovation was introduced by Mayor McCloskey.

Airmail Flight from Beaverton May 19

As a special feature of National Air Mail week, May 15-21, Beaverton is sponsoring an air mail flight from Leonard airport to Swan Island at 1:15 p. m. May 19, Arthur S. Severson will pilot the plane.

A new 6-cent air mail postage stamp will be on sale in connection with the celebration. A special design or cachet showing the geographical location of Beaverton, has been drawn by Mrs. J. R. Talbert, F. H. Schoene, of the Beaver Engraving Co. is making the cut for the cachet and the students of the high school are furnishing a rubber stamp which will be placed on every air mail letter leaving the postoffice next week.
