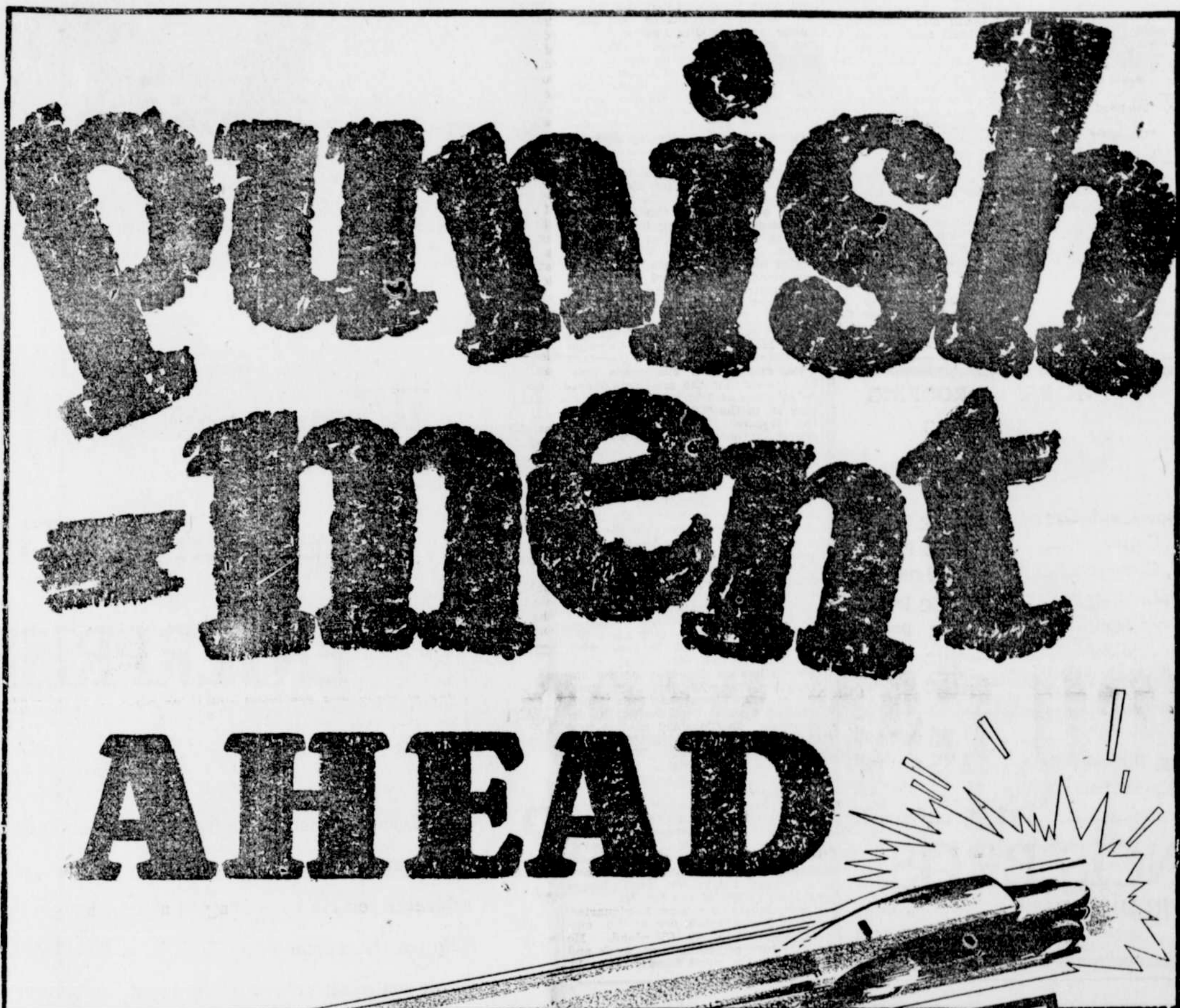

## 8000 Gallons of Air to One of Gas

It takes 8,000 gallons of air to burn one gallon of Mobilgas in the modern car, according to A. H.
