## Hawaiian Lei Serves as

Expression of Good Will  
The Hawaiian lei is an inexpensive ornament in general, but it may be made magnificent with rare and exotic blooms serving as the background of the wreath of fragrance, most of the flowers of which may be plucked from any garden. Some of the leis are made by florists but those worn by the residents are usually made at home, and much imagination and ingenuity are employed in the construction of the designs.

Some blossoms are placed in their natural state in the floral rope while others are opened wide and spread over the background of soft ferns, all being laced together and strung to the thread that supports the wreath. The design may be a graciously formal one or a haphazard riot of color.

The lei, as a garland of flowers, had its origin in the welcome to the spring and serves as a token of friendship and general goodwill. It is appropriate to almost any occasion and is often used as a table decoration, replacing the customary vases of dinner flowers. Its spirit is that of hospitality and its widespread use is one of the most delightful customs of the Hawaiians.

Hawaii as a meeting place of East and West, where the races of the Orient and the Occident have formed a unique civilization, has long held a fascination for world travelers.

## Maritime History Exploited

Great Britain's maritime history is fully exploited in the National Maritime museum at Greenwich. It occupies the famous Queen's house, designed in 1618 as a country home for Anne of Denmark, the queen of James I. The work of the royal navy, the merchant navy and the fishing fleets, and every department of maritime affairs, and all that has to do with the lives and activities of seamen are represented. Together with an extensive library of books and manuscripts, charts, maps, globes, and navigation instruments, is the admiralty's collection of ship models, portraits of seamen, representations of battles at sea, and relics of Admiral Nelson.

## Distilled Spirits

Distilled spirits, whiskeys, gins, and rums are produced by the distillation of the fermented mash of grains or sugar cane. Brandy is produced by the distillation of fermented fruit juices, principally grapes. The distilling of Scotch whisky goes back several hundred years. It was started by Highland natives for their own use, according to an authority. They used barley which they malted and dried over peat fires. This produced its smoky flavor. There are five styles of Scotch whisky.

## BABSON SAYS

Continued from Page 1

5. BANK DEPOSITS are a splendid forecaster of business. They usually turn six months or more before the business trend shifts. They began to dip well before business slanted downward last year and they have been steadily increasing since last December. Meanwhile, commercial loans have been falling for months. This indicates that inventories have been steadily reduced.

6. STEEL OPERATIONS are a sensitive barometer of industry. They rise and fall with business activity more closely than 90 per cent of the other industrial indexes. Since early June, operations have improved modestly. Meanwhile, steel scrap prices, almost an infallible forecaster of steel operations have jumped more than 20 per cent.

7. COTTON CLOTH SALES are the favorite "caller of the turn" for many observers. Cotton cloth is representative of the inventory situation. When cloth purchasing starts vigorously, it means that inventories must be replenished. Therefore, it is highly significant that in the last few weeks sales of print cloth have far outstripped production. Moreover, inventory buying has already spread into other textile lines and into the hide, leather, and shoe markets.

Why Fall Business will be Good  
There are many indicators which I could cite to back up my optimism. However, I have listed the major signs of the turn. Just as important, of course, are the factors which will keep the business machinery going now that it has started again. Among them are:

1. Largest credit reserves and easiest credit rules in history.  
2. Biggest crops in many years to be sold at fairly good prices.  
3. Best possibilities for a home building boom in history due to FHA mortgages.

4. Billions of dollars being spent for armaments, public works, and relief.

5. Prices of most products and wages of most workers have been reduced to a sane basis.

6. Vast potential demand for goods of all kinds—from shoes to shirts to locomotives and generating plants.

These vital trends can give business a great forward push this Fall. The sharpness of the Recession drop may, I believe, be equalled by an almost vertical upswing. There is no financial debris to clean up after this Recession as there was after the 1929-32 debacle. People have lost money, but few have been ruined. Business organizations are intact and all set to go. Washington wants good business. Hence, I am confident that the Recession turn has come and that business should be better in the months ahead.
