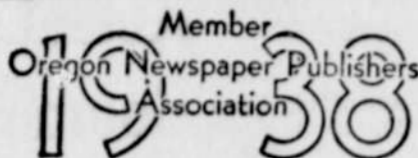

### Hungarian Folk Dance

The csardas, Hungarian folk dance, is more than 100 years old. It made its appearance at society balls in 1838 and it took two years for the dance to gain popularity in Budapest. At a ball given in 1840 in honor of Franz Liszt a display of the csardas was given by young couples. The dance had been popular among the peasants of Hungary time immemorial. It is a fast dance in two-four tempo to music made up of Hungarian national melodies.

### Genius Not Recognized

Often genius is not recognized for generations, says Collier's Weekly, Spinoza and his philosophy were forgotten for 100 years after his death in 1677. Shakespeare was not considered an exceptional playwright for 150 years after he died in 1616. El Greco (1542-1614) was not acknowledged a genius in oils until a few years ago, while Walther von der Vogelweide was not recognized as a great lyric poet until almost 600 years after his death.

### Man-Made God

While many Britons have been canonized abroad, only one attained the eminent position of a god amongst a civilized people. This was William Murdoch of Ayrshire, the discoverer of coal-gas for lighting purposes, says London Tit-Bits Magazine. When Naser-ed-Din, Shah of Persia, visited London in 1873 he was struck with wonder at the gas illumination in his hotel suite and asked to be allowed to visit the gasworks where it was generated. There, to his amazement, he learned that the inventor of gas was a man named Murdoch, for "Merdoch" is the name of the ancient God of Light of the Assyrians, Babylonians and Persians. He was positive that the Scot was a reincarnation of the Persian god and had a portrait of him enshrined in the royal palaces of Teheran and Kasr Kadjar, and from that point he figured as a diety in the religion of the Sufl sect of persia.

## THE HORNETS' NEST



### Copper Used for Tools Before Birth of Christ

Copper was the earliest metal used by man. About 8,000 years before the birth of Christ it was beaten into tools. Two thousand years later men had learned to extract it from ores and use it. It took another 2,000 years for men to learn the value of combining it with tin to make bronze. When they learned that, the use of copper became so important in that early culture that the whole period was named the Age of Bronze.

About two-thirds of all the copper produced in the world comes from the United States, says a writer in the Washington Star. Pure copper is found in Michigan around Lake Superior, in nuggets and strands and irregular masses sometimes weighing several hundred tons, and sometimes in irregular fantastic shapes which look like weird and fancy plants.

Copper is a brilliant metal of golden reddish color. It weighs eight times as much as water does, melts at the high temperature of something like 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, and tarnishes green in damp air. Practically all important deposits of copper ore are believed to have been caused by volcanic activity. Among the chief copper ores are cuprite, melaconite, malachite and cheslyite. The sulphur ores are, from the economic point of view, the most valuable because they yield the richest proportion of pure copper.

Compared with other metals, there is little copper in the earth's crust. There is much more aluminum, and nickel. But even so, we manage to produce 1.3 pounds of copper annually for each person on earth.

We use all this copper for such things as electric wires, in telephones and automobiles, in ships and ammunition, for coins and fire extinguishers. Compounds of copper are used in paints and dyes, medicines and in poisons for insects and molds.
