We Use Many Unnecessary Things

In the customary way of life man
has long been habituated to the
routine usage of various substances
and materials that are not physio-
logically necessary to his continued
existence. Tea, coffee, alcohol, to-
bacco, opium and betel nut are sta-
tistically among the more conspicu-
ous examples, according to a Johns
Hopkins university authority. It is
probably safe to say that over 90
per cent of all adult human beings
habitually make use of one or more
of the component materials includ-
ed in this group. All of them con-
tain substances of considerable
physiological potency.

Istanbul in Three Parts

ed into three parts, Stamboul and
Pera-Galata on the European side,
with the Golden Horn between them,
and Scutari on the Asiatic
side across the Bosphorus. Stamboul

Earthworms Are Fond of

Meat, Eat Sugar Readily

According to W. R. Walton, senior
entomologist, United States Depart-
ment of Agriculture, earthworms
feed partly on the soil. They swal-
low great quantities of earth, from
which they digest organic matter,
both animal and vegetable. Their
digestive apparatus is equipped
with a gizzard-like organ by the aid
of which they are able to grind up
the tougher fragments of food. They
are fond of either raw or cooked
meat and will eat sugar readily.
The mouth of the earthworm is de-
void of teeth or other biting or
gnawing apparatus, and consists of
a simple sucking or grasping me-
chanism which is well supplied with
powerful muscles. When an earth-
worm wishes to grasp any small ob-
ject such as a blade of grass, it
thrusters from its mouth an appen-
dage which corresponds roughly to
the tongue of a human being. This
is used to oppose the snout of the
worm just as one presses his thumb
against his index finger, enabling it
to grasp firmly any slender object.
By use of this apparatus the earth-
worm is enabled to draw leaves
or other objects into its burrows.
Fresh leaves are frequently taken in-
to the burrow, and the worm then
moistens the innermost ends of
them with a secretion from its
mouth, which starts fermentation
and soon renders the leaves suffi-
ciently tender to enable it to tear
off fragments for its food.

Earthworms crawl by means of
alternate contraction and expansion
of the muscular rings forming their
bodies. In these movements they
are helped by rows of very short,
stiff bristles, placed along the sides
of the body. They have no eyes,
but are sensitive to light. They have
no ears, but are sensitive to air
currents and especially to the
slightest vibration of the ground.
Their eggs are placed in capsules,
surrounded by a gelatinous food.
Crows find these capsules a great
delicacy. Not much is known about
how and when the eggs hatch, but
the young grow into adults in about
three months.

Visitors Walk Safely on

Island of Trinidad Lake

All lakes aren't filled with water.
On the island of Trinidad, off the
coast of South America, there is an
asphalt lake covering more than a
hundred acres. The surface is
brownish-black and wrinkled, like
an old piece of leather. People can
walk on the lake without sinking,
their feet leaving only faint prints.
Men work on the lake digging out the
asphalt to ship to all parts of the
world. A railroad track is laid
across the surface to the place
where the digging is going on.
Each morning the hole made the
day before is filled up, and the rail-
road track sunken and twisted from
the movement of the asphalt during
the night.

For a long time, says a writer
in the Washington Star, it was
thought that there was no end to
the supply of asphalt, but during
the last 50 years, when 5,000,000
tons of asphalt have been removed,
the surface of the lake has dropped
50 feet. It will take many, many
years to use up the supply, but some
day in the far distant future man-
kind may have to think up some
new substance with which to sur-
face his streets.

Bridges Get "Tired Feeling"

Bridges may become tired and
lose their strength, just as human
beings do when overtaxed, states a
report made to the American Soci-
ety of Civil Engineers. The bridges
affected by "fatigue" are those
composed of huge steel framework.
The steel may lose from half to
two-thirds of its strength. But
there's no need to worry. Loads
sufficient to cause "that tired feel-
ing" are unusual, and occur, ac-
cording to the report, only a "few
thousand times" in the life of a
bridge. It's only when they occur
millions of times that any bad ef-
fects result.
