Big Massacre Blamed on

Smell of Baking Bread

An Indian who wouldn't take no for an answer when he wanted bread and could smell it baking, precipitated one of the bloodiest Indian massacres in Michigan's history, says a Byron (Mich.) correspondent in the Detroit Free Press. As a result the little town of Byron, settled in 1825, was wiped out and every family—except one—slaughtered. The one family was that headed by a miller named Smith.

The Indians refused to harm Smith because he had taken one of their chiefs who was severely injured into his home and cared for him until he recovered.

The massacre resulted when the husband of the woman who refused to give bread to the Indian walked into the house and shot him dead. The Indians demanded immediately that the killer be turned over to them for punishment. They threatened to kill and scalp every settler and burn their homes unless this were done.

In general the settlers felt that the killing had not been justified, but they stubbornly refused to submit one of their members to the Indians for torture. They sent a runner to get a company of soldiers from the fort at Detroit.

That night, Smith, who had been confined to bed because of an illness, heard guns fired, piercing cries of agony and the roar of flames consuming his neighbors' log cabins. He rushed from bed to the door. A blanketed Indian told him to go back to bed.

Smith attempted to go to the help of his friends through a back window. Another Indian barred his way. Imprisoned in his cabin he watched the destruction of the village.

The next day a squad of soldiers arrived. They found the village reduced to piles of charred logs, and heaps of hot ashes covered by the bodies of the victims, with Smith's family the only living beings.

Fort Garry Became Winnipeg

Of the original Fort Garry, built about a century ago at the juncture of the Assiniboine and Red rivers in western Canada, only the gate itself remains. Fort Garry became today's Winnipeg. It was the scene of the "provisional government" which Louis Riel, the half-breed rebel, established in 1869. The Chateau de Ramezay, eleventh governor of Montreal, was built in 1704 by Claude de Ramezay, the head-quarters of Montgomery during the American occupation of the city in 1775, and in its vaults a printing press was set up by Benjamin Franklin. Benedict Arnold once lived there. Today it is a portrait gallery and museum.

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crews are paid for four days' work! In addition to, or as an alternative to, the wage cut, there is a good chance that this stacking of the payroll will go out this Fall. Another estimated \$100,000,000 could thus stay in railroad treasuries.

The final "helping hand" is the recession itself. By that I mean that the railroads in the last twelve months have learned how far they can stretch their dollars. Commodity prices are way below a year ago. In material buying alone the roads are probably saving at the rate of \$30,000,000 annually compared with 1937. Moreover, thousands of employees have been discharged. In spite of higher wage rates, the payroll is \$25,000,000 below last year level. In addition, there have been hundreds of small economies which collectively amount to a big sum.

Savings Almost Half Billion
Here is a table summarizing the potential yearly savings mentioned above:

Freight Traffic Increase	\$100,000,000
Freight Rate Increase	100,000,000
Fare Increase	30,000,000
Wage Cut	100,000,000
"Feather-Bedding" Saving	100,000,000
Material Buying	30,000,000

Now of course as their business increases the railroads' expenses will also increase. More men will have to be put back to work, more money will have to be spent on road bed, depots, etc., more equipment will have to be bought. However, a big portion of this \$485,000,000 should be carried into net income. The industry's annual deficit has been running around \$300,000,000. Hence, if all these estimated savings take place, the carriers should again be able to pay their bills and meet the interest on their bonds.

Basic Problems Not Solved
Therefore, I am hopeful that the danger of more railroad receiverships has gone by for the time being. In fact, railroad securities may score a sharp gain in price than any other group over the next six months! But do not forget that the above betterments in the rail situations have not altered the long-term, underlying problems of the carriers. For this latter reason, wise investors are now beginning to reduce their railroad holdings. Often it is not safe to wait too long for the anticipated higher prices. Everyone cannot sell at the same time.
