dence returns and the scramble for
goods and securities is on. Bullish
news fills the papers. The radio
commentators dress it up sensation-
ally. Then we have another feverish
boomlet.

Hence, it seems to me that busi-
ness is being run on mob psychology.
Moreover, this up-and-down trend is
accented by the new governmental
control of business. The President
comments favorably or unfavorably
on the business outlook. In fifteen
minutes his remarks have reached
every hamlet and farm. The effect
is tremendous! So I think these
are the reasons why the ups-and-
downs of business are much sharper
than they were 30 years ago.

Statistics Cannot be Ignored
To go back to Mr. Trundle's story,
however, there is still one more
thought. If business continually in-
creased its meat and bun orders, in-
dependent of what statistics showed,
we would soon be in hot water. Peo-
ple can eat only so many hotdogs.
Inventories can get so big that they
can ruin business. Periods of adjust-
ment are necessary to keep business
alive. Just as there would be no
human race if we did not get indig-
estation when we eat too much, so
our present business system would
have died long ago if we did not
have periods of reaction.

But now the 1937-8 reaction is fast
passing. The Babson chart is only
19 per cent below Normal today com-
pared with 28 per cent under Nor-
mal eight weeks ago. The pain is
gone. It is time to stop moaning
about it. Start doing business now.
Do not delay until conditions are
booming, prices sky-high and another
reaction just around the corner.
Remember, those who wait to get
the proof seldom get the profit!

Oregon's farm youth will have a

prizes and scholarships valued at
over \$7,000 at the 1938 Oregon State
Fair at Salem, September 5 to 11.
Manager Leo G. Spitzbart pointed out
this week.

"We are growing increasingly
youth-conscious at the Fair," Mr.
Spitzbart says. "This year's large
array of prizes is given to encourage
farm-minded young men and women
to take advantage of the progressive
agricultural practices. A well trained

Oregon State Fair will offer nearly

at about \$1,500, to attend the annual
summer school at the state college.

The list of prizes is also boosted
by numerous specials which will be
given. Interested firms and individ-
uals will present winners with pure-
bred livestock, silver cups and addi-
tional cash awards.

farm life will be found. Cash prizes
will go to winners for their work
with farm mechanics, livestock,
crops, home economics and other
fields.
