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BILLIONS AND SENSE

To say that the federal government spent a billion dollars in the first six weeks of the new fiscal year, or that it will spend eight and two-thirds billions in the whole year, doesn't mean much because billions are beyond the comprehension of most people.

But translated into a little different terms it begins to mean something. It means, for example, that the federal government this year will spend \$67 for every man, woman and child in the nation. It means that \$67 will be collected in taxes, or borrowed, for every person in the land.

It means that \$67 per person will be withdrawn from the regular channels of trade, from the tills of storekeepers, from the pockets of farmers and workers all over the nation.

Worse still, it means that once again the government will spend more than its income, for out of the \$67 about \$22 will have to be borrowed. Thus another two or three billion will be added to the debt.

Any individual who lived beyond his means for nine successive years would long since have found his credit gone. He couldn't continue to charge things by simply saying that he faces an emergency. Uncle Sam is getting nearer that point every day.

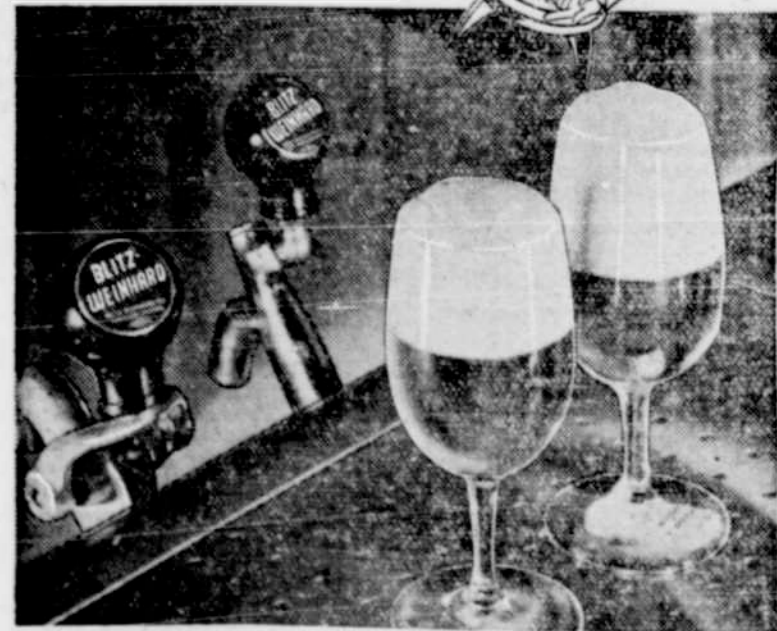
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
