

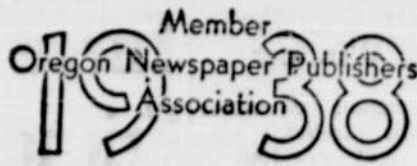

FOREIGN PROPAGANDA

All any American citizen has to do is to look abroad at any country—Russia, Germany, Italy, or elsewhere—to know that we can do without their theories of government in this country. We want no regimentation of farmers, of industry, or of labor. We can do without dictatorships.

One of the most notable investigative jobs that is being done in this country, therefore is that of the House Committee headed by Representative Dies of Texas. Charged with the investigation of "un-American activities," the Committee for the first time has spread publicly upon the records of Congress the extent to which the Communist Internationale has infiltrated into American patriotic, peace, organized labor, and political movements. It has shown how the Communists set up dummy organizations under high-sounding, patriotic names such as their "League for Peace and Democracy," to front for doctrines designed to overthrow the American Constitution.

Now the Dies committee is setting out to expose other alien propaganda espousing Nazism, Fascism, etc. It is hoped that Congress will provide the funds for the inquiry to go the whole way in developing the extent to which these foreign "isms" are being propagandized in this country.

The sentiments of all thoughtful Americans have been reflected by Charles R. Hook, President of the National Association of Manufacturers, who said in a letter to Representative Dies:

"Those who are behind such movements should be forced to stand before the public and receive the judgment of the people. If they are industrialists, doctors, teachers, ministers, or political dilettantes let their names be registered in the official records of your committee"

They want to re-establish their credit with us therefore, there is a marked movement afoot over here to make a compromise on the huge debt which England owes America. This would get the pending Anglo-American trade pact off to a flying start and help business in both countries.

Business Boom Ahead
As a result of these cheerful foreign developments, I am able to give you the following optimistic report on the business outlook for the next few months.

I am convinced that American business will score further sharp and healthy gains. Christmas trade this year could easily be the best in eight seasons. Seldom in my thirty-five years' experience have I been able to make a more definite and emphatic forecast of better times!

WEST SLOPE ITEMS

To say that West Slope is growing would be putting it mildly. It is growing by leaps and bounds. Located a little way north of Beaverton along Canyon road it has a decidedly picturesque view to the south and west, with "the big hill" to the east. Clara R. French who deals in real estate and insurance, and is a notary public as well as registrar, has sold about sixty per cent of the property that has been sold there since 1932 when she started in. About sixty per cent of the West Slope homes have been built during the last three years and this fall so far there has been a noteworthy record made, not only in sale of acreage but in improved homes.

The Christian Church organization bought 2 1/2 acres from Mrs. French a short time ago and are building a large home for their aged. The basement and foundation has been completed and the frame work is under way. The project will be around \$4,500 and is located on SW Walker

road, north of Canyon road. Raibston P. Bennett has built a new house in West Slope addition to Washington county, a short distance east of Beaverton on 1/4 of an acre purchased from Mrs. French. The house is completed and is very attractive.

Sam D. Allen a ticket agent for the Southern Pacific Company bought an acre tract between the old and new Canyon road and will soon start construction of a fine \$6,000 house.

Johannes Jergensen of Beaverton, purchased a half acre lately and recently finished building a house on it. R. W. Biddle has erected a small house on a one half acre tract he bought, located at Johnson Acres, along Walker road, West Slope. This is only a temporary house and next year he will build a large modern house.

Elsworth Hooker purchased a half acre at Johnson Acres and has erected a temporary house. He will put up a modern house next year.

Clarence H. Nelson bought an acre on new Canyon Road and will put up a \$5,000 home soon. He is a Portland man.

Lewis Brisbin of Sylvan bought five acres of the old Johnson farm along Walker road on which he will do some improving this fall with intentions of building a large modern house next summer.

M. E. Hinds bought an acre and a half on Sunset road at Sunset View and has built a neat little house.

Charles Walton purchased half an acre at Sunset View on which he will build a modern attractive house next spring.
