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PUBLIC OWNERSHIP —PRIVATE GRIEF

Politicians, professors and economic theorists are fond of telling business how it should operate. The implication always is, "Now if we were running that business..."

Occasionally, though, we get an insight into business operations under political management. The Federal Postal system, for instance, always operating at a deficit of millions. The railroads during the World War. The Shipping Board. The Bituminous Coal Commission, still struggling at the starting gate after two years. And, not to overlook, the cost of some of the recent public housing projects.

To the publicly owned New York city subway goes an orobid for stating most plainly the case for or against public ownership.

On advertising cards in its cars is inscribed the "shall we say 'modest'" legend.

This railroad is owned by the City of New York and is operated by the Board of Transportation. It is the foremost example of public ownership and operation in the world.

The fare is five cents. But so costly is the operation that for every five cent ride, another five and one quarter cents come from the City Treasury to make up the deficit. In other words, the public pays through taxes. And, if the subway paid taxes on its property, as do private businesses, the ride would cost still another two cents. Twelve cents per ride.

And this, the City Fathers claim, is the world's "foremost example of public ownership."

101 Years Old and Still Quite Spry

John W. Cullen of W Cullen Blvd. in the well known Glencullen district northwest of Multnomah, takes his regular walks around the neighborhood with only a common cane or walking stick as his aid. He was 101 years old last June 18 and was born at LaPort, Indiana. The family arrived in Portland Nov. 19, 1847, having come as far as Laramie, Wyoming, when their oxen ran away with the buffalo herd and they never got them back. They footed it from there into the Oregon country. In his younger days he learned the printing trade at Olympia, Washington, and worked on various newspapers. Later he decided to learn the saddlery business, making harness and most anything in leather goods. He worked at Lafayette in Yamhill county, La-

ter he got farm land, about 200 acres of it, in what is now Glencullen district and has his house located near the present home of Detective Abbott. He kept dairy cows a good while. This beautiful Glencullen district covers the old Cullen farm. Mr. Cullen is healthy and spry and alert a mind and enjoys talking over old times.

Songs That Reach Heart

Must Picture the Scene

The better a song enables those hearing it to visualize a scene, the better the song, obviously. Such songs never die. There are songs that have helped untold thousands to visualize a scene or emotion, writes Rev. G. White in the Detroit News.

"When Irish Eyes Are Smiling" was written by an American, Ernest Ball, some 25 years ago, and is regarded by most Americans as breathing of the very spirit of old Erin. "Love's Old Sweet Song" was written in mid-Victorian days by James L. Molloy, an Englishman.

Popular songs of the "Down by the Old Mill Stream" type may become folk songs, for the melodies are simple and sweet and the characters the ever-popular "boy-and-girl" combination. It was written by Tell Taylor in 1910. Another of this type is "Wait Till the Cows Come Home," written by Anne Caldwell in 1917.

"Comin' Through the Rye" was written by a forgotten composer in the Seventeenth century. Robert Burns set down the words we all know. The song refers to the Rye river, rather than a field of rye. Young gallants waited by the stream, which had no bridge, and offered to carry the neighborhood lassies across. In mid-stream they would demand a kiss for a fee, threatening to drop the passenger in the water unless it were paid.

The "Spring Song" is perhaps the best known of the great Mendelssohn's shorter numbers. Several lyrics have been written to the music. "Listen to the Mocking Bird" was written shortly before the Civil war. "Put on Your Old Gray Bonnet" dates to the early Twentieth century.

Name Honor Means "Honor"

Honor, Honora and Honoria, feminine forms of this Latin name mean "honor," while Honorate and Honore, also feminine, mean "honored," as do the masculine forms, Honorius and Honore, the latter a French form pronounced in three syllables, writes Florence A. Cowles in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. St. Honora of the Sixth century was the daughter of a British king and there was also a St. Honoria in early days. Honore, Comte de Mirabeau (d. 1791), was a French statesman. Honore de Balzac (d. 1850), French novelist, viewed his own works as part of one great human comedy. Honore Daumier (d. 1879) was a French caricaturist, painter and sculptor.

Shrine Founded in 710

Entering the deer park of Nara, you pass through a great torii, or front gate, of red wood and stroll past many stone lanterns and wistaria-festooned trees. Finally you reach the vermilion-painted Kasuga-no-Miya, a Shinto shrine which Fujiwara Fuhito founded in 710. It is dedicated to the original ancestor of the Fujiwara family, who was not far removed from the sun goddess, and is one of Japan's most ancient, venerated sanctuaries. A good example of primitive Japanese architecture, the Kasuga shrine has often been rebuilt like most Shinto temples.

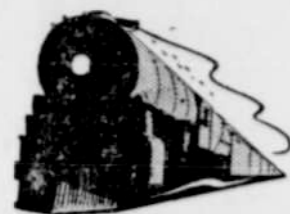

Boulanger's restaurant, which opened in Paris in 1765, was the first dining establishment to offer a choice of foods and liquors. Previously, says Collier's Weekly, the only public eating places were coffee houses and taverns, serving "regular" meals at a common table at a fixed time and price. Parisians so enjoyed eating when and what they liked that, by 1810, the city had more than 125 restaurants, one of which served 197 meat dishes.
