BUSINESS AND POLITICS

About a year ago the bottom suddenly dropped from under the flow of business and, as income fell, it became necessary to lay off thousands of workers.

Politicians immediately jumped on this to prove that business did not want recovery and charged that the depression was conceived as a political move by business to embarrass the present administration.

It would be interesting to know how these political economists now explain the fact that just a few weeks before the election, at a time when more men should have been laid off to carry such a strategy through, industry found its markets coming back and rehired many of those laid off. The automobile industry alone, which was reputed to be the big bad wolf of the scheme, called back more than 100,000 workers within a month before the election.

Perhaps, though, the politicians would prefer that the subject not be raised. It is as difficult for them to explain how it happened that business turned upward in the Spring before the new pump-priming funds could be hauled to the pump.

of putting funds into new enterprises.

End of Tax-Exempts
 (3) Elimination of tax-exempt bonds will be one of the biggest factors in pushing up corporation security prices over the next few months. I think that tax exemption on new government bonds will be stopped. Many people who buy such bonds because of the elimination features alone, will prefer choice bonds and stocks of private companies.

(4) Interest rates are very low. The low rates paid at savings banks and on life insurance premiums and annuities, and the fact that no interest is paid on commercial accounts, make many persons seek choice securities selling to yield 3 to 4 per cent. Some of these people were never before interested in stocks or bonds.

(5) Foreign funds are constantly drifting into American investments. The United States and Canada are a haven for distressed capital from all parts of a frightened world.

CONCLUSION
 The combination of the huge demand for good securities and the diminishing supply of such issues should push prices of well-selected stocks and bonds higher. Although prices have already advanced sharply, I am convinced that medium-grade bonds or choice stocks will move higher.

P. S. I have received so many letters from friends and critics of Dr. Townsend regarding my statements of two weeks ago in this column that it is physically impossible for me to answer them. Therefore, I take this means of thanking both those who criticize

and those who approve. I shall try to be guided by all this correspondence. R.W.B.

Stinging Nettle Weeds

Among the Most Useful

Stinging nettles are among the most unpopular and, be it known, the most useful of weeds. From time immemorial, observes a writer in London Tit-Bits magazine, the fiber has been used to make cordage, coarse cloth, and even paper. Young nettle-tops, thoroughly boiled, make a tasty vegetable, and the juice of the leaves cures blood-spitting and other kinds of hemorrhage. Chopped nettleleaves mixed with their food makes fowls lay in the off season, and imparts a gloss to the coats of cattle and horses.

Boiled leaves of dandelion make an excellent substitute for spinach. Bleached, they form an agreeable ingredient in a salad. The root has valuable tonic properties, and is particularly good in liver trouble. Many country-folk consider this the finest medicine in the world. They mash the roots in a mortar, and mix with one-third their measure of spirits of wine.

Camomile, another composite plant, is very common on waste ground. The flower-heads provide the familiar camomile tea. Besides being a pleasant drink, this is a fine thing for indigestion. Coltsfoot is another relative of the dandelion, and an excellent cure for cough. The leaves are either made into a tea, or dried and smoked in a pipe.

Gray Thrush Flies High;

Solitaire Lofty Dweller

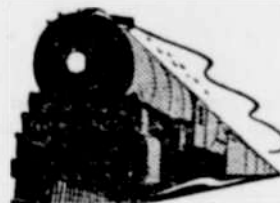
In the high mountains of the western states, where the Douglas fir grow far apart on the sides of the broken granite slopes, a gray bird flies quietly through the scattering woods and alights on the upturned roots of a fallen tree. After a few minutes it deserts its perch to catch an insect in mid-air, much as do the bluebirds of the plains below. It is a Townsend's solitaire, a bird reclusive of the mountain solitudes, writes Ruth Wheeler in Nature magazine.

The solitaire is a thrush and one of the loftiest dwellers of all the thrush family. There is an air of mystery about these birds that flit quietly and unobtrusively through the mountain forests. They never go in flocks but seem to live to themselves, satisfied with the vast expanse of the upper world that is their kingdom.

Just as wild and full of romance as the region in which he lives is the song of the solitaire. He usually pours out his melody in a clear, rippling, penetrating warble from the summit of a high stub. This full, free song is the very spirit of the forest, the granite crags, and the tumbling mountain streams.

Red Cross Volunteers Assist War Veterans

Red Cross workers in chapters, in hospitals and on posts of the Army, Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps, assisted 122,355 active service men or veterans or their families during the past 12 months.

Red Cross service to these men included such personal help as letter writing, shopping and recreational leadership, but it also included financial assistance to their dependents, help in locating missing members of their families, and assistance in filing necessary applications for pensions, disability pay, hospitalization, or for discharge from active service because of home needs.

The average number of men assisted by Red Cross workers each month was 18,790, according to a recent report.
