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IS EDUCATIONAL FREEDOM DEAD?

As Americans we have always been proud of our institutions of higher education, built largely by the contributions and endowments of those who have prospered under our system of private initiative and free enterprise.

Thoughtful Americans might well pause, however, and reflect on the warning by President Ralph Cooper Hutchinson of Washington and Jefferson College that the days of the so-called independent colleges are numbered if present trend continues.

Forecasting elimination of these institutions within fifty years, Dr. Hutchinson said: "The reasons for this are obvious. These colleges are supported through gifts from the surplus of individuals, and this surplus, although earned, is now being taxed away from individuals."

He asserted that funds raised by "confiscatory taxation" were being used to create "unnecessary and enormously expensive institutions of higher learning."

If Government pays the bills, he continued, Government will dictate the nature of subjects to be taught. "Nowhere in the world were universities so free of political domination as in Germany when this system was instituted," he said, "but when Fascism rose in Germany, these supposedly free institutions were the first to be subjugated."

Beethoven's Bust Honored in Home Of Girl Violinist

A bust of Beethoven rests on a pedestal in the studio of the little girl violinist, Mildred Lind, who is to play at the Neighbors of Woodcraft auditorium the night of November 29. This statue is a shrine of worship to the youthful artist, and she daily places a floral tribute on the pedestal, for inspiration in her work. She believes, as Richard Wagner has said—"First I believe in God, and then in Beethoven."

In her Portland concert Mildred will play the "Spring" sonata of Beethoven, opus 24. Coming from San Francisco to assist as pianist will be Douglas Thompson, who has toured the world playing under famous conductors, including Arnold Schonberg.
