Isaac, of Hebrew Origin, Name for Many Notables

The name Isaac, of Hebrew origin, has a curious meaning—"the laughter." The Bible Isaac, son of Abraham and father of Jacob, is said to have lived to 180, writes Florence A. Cowles in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Isaac I was emperor of Constantinople in the Eleventh century, and Isaac II sovereign of the East in the Twelfth century.

Izaak Walton (1593-1683), English essayist and poet, is called "the father of angling." His "Compleat Angler" appeared in five editions in his lifetime and has been published more than 100 times since his death.

Sir Isaac Newton (1642-1727), great English mathematician and natural philosopher, discovered in the fall of an apple the law of gravitation, investigated the nature of light and the laws of motion.

Rev. Isaac Watts (d. 1748) wrote hymns, also poems for children, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "Let Dogs Delight to Bark and Bite," etc.

Among other noted Isaacs of the past are: Allerton (d. 1659) wealthy Pilgrim Father who came to America on the first voyage of the Mayflower and whose daughter, Mary, was the last survivor of the Mayflower company; Backus (d. 1806) American clergyman who advocated separation of church and state; Bickerstaffe (d. 1812) Irish playwright, author of "The Miller of Dee," etc.; Chauncey (d. 1840) American naval hero of the War of 1812 and later commandant of the Brooklyn navy yard; Hull (d. 1843) American naval officer.

Babbitt (d. 1862) soap manufacturer and inventor of Babbitt metal, an alloy, for which he was given a gold medal and a grant by congress; Taylor (d. 1889) American physician who suggested the hypodermic use of morphia and strychnia; Hayes (d. 1887) early Arctic explorer; Singer (d. 1875) founder of the Singer Sewing Machine company; Pitman, Sir (1813-97), inventor of the Pitman system of shorthand, and Funk (d. 1912) co-founder of the publishing firm of Funk & Wagnalls.

Carry Young on back

The large mute swan will carry her young on her back. This bird is very jealous of her territory, and it is her custom in many districts to get her young away from the lake on which they were born. She will carry them long distances while swimming on a river or lake, but when she goes overland they usually toddle behind her in single file. Baby opossums are carried on the back of their mother in an ingenious manner. She bends her tail over her back, and the eight or ten youngsters curl their tails round that of their mother; they have to hold on tightly, for she will travel quickly through the forest.

Greek Mythology Reveals

Stories of the Dogwood

Although the various dogwoods are sometimes so small that they seem hardly more than a good-sized shrub, they have been known for centuries and their legendary history reaches into Greek mythology, to the Roman empire at the time of Christ and to the folklore of early American Indian tribes. Their slender, twisted branches and unusual four-petaled flowers have seemed to call for explanation and the legends have tried to account for them, writes Paul Davey in the Washington Star.

One of the legends is to the effect that the dogwood, because of the hardness of its wood, was chosen for use in the cross at the crucifixion. The technical name of the tree is Cornus, from the Latin corna, a horn, and refers to the character of the wood. The legend runs that the dogwood was much distressed at being chosen for such a terrible purpose and that the Saviour, sensing this feeling, made to the tree this promise:

"Never again shall the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used for a cross. Henceforth it shall be slender and bent and twisted and its blossom shall be in the form of a cross—two long and two short petals and in the center of the outer edge of each petal there shall be nail prints, brown with rust and stained with blood, and the center of the flower will be a crown of thorns.

"All those who see it will remember it was on the dogwood that I was crucified and this tree shall not be mutilated or destroyed, but cherished and protected as a reminder of My agony and death upon the cross."

It is a beautiful way of explaining the peculiarities of the dogwood. History does not bear out the legendary assumption that the cross was made from the wood of the dogwood, but that does not take away from the beauty of the legend.

Greyhounds Pictured on Ancient Egyptian Stones

Earliest records of dogs include the greyhound, variations of this breed being depicted on Egyptian stones. The Afghan hound and the Saluki are forms of the greyhound, although their appearance is somewhat different. The Afghan hound is well covered with hair and the Saluki, noble in appearance, is distinguished mainly by luxuriant feathering.

England has made wide use of hounds and, although not recognized, the old hound dog is a familiar sight in America, writes Edwin McK. Johnson in the Chicago Daily News. English breeds include the Bassett, Beagle, harrier, bloodhound and whippet—each with its distinct function. With the exception of the whippet, these breeds are scent hunters. The whippet, like the greyhound, Saluki, Afghan, Borzois and Irish Wolfhound are primarily sight hunters, running down quarry by sheer speed and power rather than by tracking.

The foxhound and harrier are dogs of the chase. Beagles, too, are used in packs as are cross-bred hounds.

The Borzois (Russian wolfhound) is one of the most-artistic appearing breeds, but its background reveals its original use for tearing wolves to pieces. Running in packs, these large dogs provided rare sport for the Romanoffs.

Irish wolfhounds, once near extinction, are the largest dogs of all.

Shoe-Throwing as Newly Married Ancient Custom

The custom of throwing shoes at newly married couples is very old and may be a relic of the ancient practice of giving a shoe to another to symbolize the transfer of possession. Sometimes new ownership was symbolized by throwing the shoe on the property in question. "Over Edom will I cast out my shoe," says Psalm 60: 8, meaning that the country was to be subdued. In Ruth 4:7, we read:

"Now this was the manner in former time in Israel concerning redeeming and concerning changing, for to confirm all things; a man plucked off his shoe, and gave it to his neighbor; and this was a testimony in Israel." Accordingly, when Boaz's kinsman relinquished his rights to Ruth and her inheritance, he "drew off his shoe" in the presence of witnesses.

Among the Anglo-Saxons it was customary for the father to give one of his daughter's shoes to the bridegroom, who touched her on the head with it, the ceremony signifying the passage of authority and dominion over the daughter from parent to husband. Later, it is supposed, the custom degenerated and the shoe was thrown after the couple as they departed for their new house.

Some writers, however, believe that throwing shoes at newly married pairs represents missile-throwing and is a savage survival of the days when the bride was often carried away by force from her people who attempted to drive off her abductor. This theory seems to be partially confirmed by the practice in Turkey and other parts of the Near East, where the bridegroom alone is chased by the guests and pelted with slippers.
