Bus Signal Lights Installed at Huber

A signal light system to announce that passengers are to be picked up is a feature of the new bus station at Huber, neighboring community.

Has Good Home; Started with \$10

If you think it can't be done, just ask L. D. Taylor of West Slope who bought half an acre of ground a short distance south of the Cobb store about nine years ago, paying \$10 down. He contracted to pay the balance in small monthly payments.

He started in building a house using plans for a good sized house, buying lumber as he went along, getting the frame up and enclosed, then putting in whatever spare time he could working on the house.

It took a long time to get the job done, but it was not long before the family could live there. Some work is yet to be done, including the new siding and some of the interior is yet to be completed but this house is substantially built and the roof has an extra steep pitch and is a good one. He has worked at common labor most of the time, but has put his money where it would do himself and family the most good—into their home. The cost of the half acre was \$600 even more money than would be charged for land equally good there now but Taylor paid out on his own easy terms which, he and wife contend has been far better than paying out rent every month.

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Fireplace Given Place in Topics

One of the most attractive and substantially made fireplaces in this area is the one at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Otto A. Robinson along Watson road south of Allen avenue, near Beaverton. Mr. Robinson built it eight or nine years ago at the time he built their cozy and spacious log cabin, using in this fireplace the choicest black stone of varied shapes and faces. It is located at the north end of their large living room and is so made that it throws out heat evenly to all parts of the room and on the coldest days they have in this part of Oregon only a light fire need be kept to keep moderate temperature in after the rooms are once warmed.

Other adjoining rooms, merely open the doors and "brush-up" the fire a bit more and it's generally all the heating facility needed. This system of heating is economical when the fireplace is made right. They use knots and odd shapes of wood and logs furnished them at less money than regular cord wood prices. If you want to see a pretty fireplace, you'll find this just that kind.
