The controversy over whether the House of Representatives should continue its investigation of un-American activities in the United States is ended. Despite pressure of officials opposing the investigation, the House has seen fit to project the probe for another year.

In so doing the House followed the dictate of the public, as was evidenced by the polls of public opinion on the question. But of more importance was the recognition by the Congressmen that a real threat to Americanism exists; that communism, fascism and other alien "isms" are making inroads in some spots in America, and that unless they are exposed now the overthrow of Constitutional government might some day come about.

It is important, too, that the public is aware of the threat. Had the public been unaware of it, there would have been no great public demand for continuance of the investigation.

This is a heartening sign that Americanism is still a cherished possession of Americans and that Americans can be aroused to protect it.

VALUE OF MINERALS TO YOUR HEALTH AND POCKETBOOK

He also states that we, as well as our cattle, are running too large stomachs because we have to eat so much food to get the necessary minerals. Professor H. C. Sherman of Columbia University states that research has definitely proven that the reason our ancestors lived so long was because of the abundant supply of minerals in their food. He further states that calcium is the most important of these necessary minerals.

Dr. Charles F. Church, director of Nutrition in the Rockefeller Institute, in a recent article states that the resistance of a person to diseases depends on the proper balance of minerals in his food. Tests with rats carried on by them showed that when the amount of Calcium was reduced one-fifth, the rate of fatality increased five times when exposed to infection. He also stated that the right mineralized diet for expectant mothers is very important in building up disease resistance in the child.
