County Dairians Form Organization

Organization of the Dairians, Washington County promotional group was begun this week in Hillsboro and will proceed as rapidly as possible, it was announced following a meeting in the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce Monday.

The Dairians to be recruited from all parts of the county, is designed to promote the interests of the dairy industry of the county and bring support to the annual spring dairy show scheduled for the county fairgrounds May 24.

Membership cards for the new organization will be ready for distribution this week. A nominal membership fee is to be charged, according to the plan, and the money thus raised will be used to defray the expenses of the show and for further promotion of the county's largest industry.

Steps to safeguard the cattle to be exhibited at the show were taken by the show committee at a recent meeting when the following rule was adopted:

"All cattle exhibited at the spring dairy show shall come from abortion free herds that have had three official tests within the last 36 months no test to have been less than 8 months apart. In addition all animals exhibited shall have an individual, official bangs test within 30 days of the show. And further provided that all cattle purchased for herds from which show animals are taken during the previous 36 months shall conform to the requirements of a certified herd."

This rule it is pointed out, conforms with the ruling established three years ago by the county fair board regarding cattle to be exhibited or housed at any time in the county fair stables.

Advocate Extending Front Street

Several leading citizens of Beaverton advocate extending Front street eastward from Lombard several blocks to intersect with Bertha-Beaverton highway which would induce construction of several good homes and afford a much better outlook from the main part of town to the highway. The street is paved and there has always been a good deal of traffic on it.

Madame Behrend to Lecture in Portland

Madame Genevieve Behrend, world-traveler and internationally known author lectures radio artist and mental scientist, of Paris and New York will present four fully-illustrated public lectures at the Portland Masonic Temple, DeMolay Room beginning Sunday evening, April 30th at 8 o'clock.

Genevieve Behrend is the founder of the School of the Builders in New York City and in Los Angeles. She has been on the public platforms of America for 25 years. For five years she was guest-artist on radio-stations KNX and KFI in Los Angeles on a weekly program.

The four lectures at the Masonic Temple are scheduled for the evenings of Sunday April 30th, Tuesday, May 2nd, Thursday, May 4th and Sunday, May 7th, all at eight o'clock.
