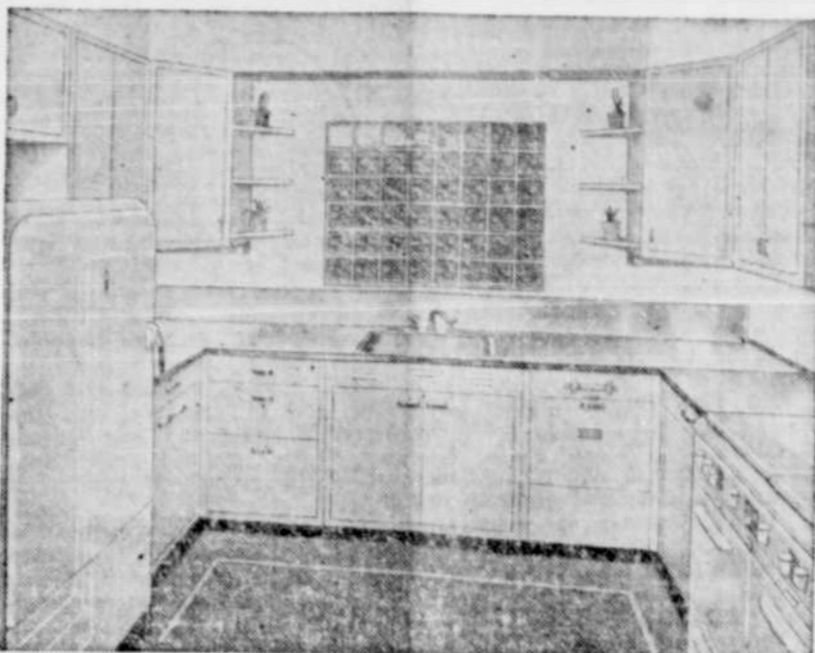

Karakul Sheep Raising Of Questionable Wisdom

Stockmen interested in raising karakul sheep should compare the karakul industry with the regular sheep industry before making their investment, says Con S. Maddox, Washington State college extension animal husbandman.

One of the best ways to learn about the industry is to visit farmers who have been in the business for at least four or five years and find from them the prices they receive for lamb pelts, the clip from ewes, the percentage of lambs produced by the karakul as compared to farm flocks of sheep, the price of breeding stock, and the prices received for mutton lambs.

Some southern Idaho breeders are reported to be saving their karakul lambs for marketing just as they would regular mutton lambs, instead of marketing the pelts. Those wishing to obtain breeding stock could probably buy these lambs at fat-lamb prices.

Because of its limited use, karakul wool usually sells for one-half to three-fourths the price paid for good quality wool, according to research done by the United States department of agriculture.

Consider Price Reports In Planning Egg Program

In urging poultrymen to study monthly egg prices before outlining their year's management program, F. P. Jeffrey, poultry instructor at the New Jersey college of agriculture, Rutgers university, offers some figures which indicate that large eggs are relatively more valuable in the fall, while small eggs are generally more profitable during spring months.

"According to the United States department of agriculture figures," he says, "53 per cent of the annual egg production occurs during the four spring months of March, April, May and June. Management factors such as use of artificial illumination in the laying house and date of hatch bear some relationship to the seasonal distribution of the egg yield."

"During the last eight years, there has been a tendency for a rapid decline in the egg market during December and January because of greater receipts during these months. At New York, in the period of 1924-30, 5.6 per cent of the annual receipts of eggs arrived during January, while in the period of 1931-37, 7.4 per cent arrived during the same month."

Farm Topics

Cold frames, hot beds, and sash houses are used to start early or tender crops. . . .

Farm economists are recommending that farmers pay cash and buy in quantity. . . .

With other things equal, the larger cows within a breed produce more milk and make more profit than smaller ones, according to animal husbandry specialists. . . .

Mechanical milk coolers are becoming popular on farms but the dairymen should remember that low temperatures only slow down the growth of bacteria and do not remove them. Strict cleanliness in handling milk should complement cooling.

duce debt, but the recent tax laws have discouraged business men in doing so. For instance, if a small and financially weak concern could buy up its notes at a substantial discount the discount would have to be reported to the end of the year as profit and be taxed at 12 to 16 per cent. Meanwhile, Big Business concerns, whose bonds and notes have been selling at par or better, have been calling their bonds and refinancing their debt. They have thus been able to take advantage of the lowest interest rates in history and have cut their fixed charges drastically. The small business man has been unable to do this.

The latest idea in Washington is to encourage debt reduction. It will permit financially weak concerns to buy in their interest bearing obligations at less than par without incurring a tax liability. As far as helping out the smaller business man from a credit standpoint, this is the first forward step that Congress has taken in a long time. The Undistributed Profits Tax was also a handicap to business concerns, big and small, who wanted to cut their debts. This tax is being completely abolished in the new "business relief" tax measure now going through Congress.

The bill, which wipes out the tax liability incurred by a company buying in its own obligations below par, is a constructive step. It can become a definite aid to executives, workers, and investors of weak business concerns. This new program should help to strengthen many second-grade bond and note issues. In fact, with high-grade corporation bonds selling at all-time highs, many business and professional men, who can afford to take a little extra risk, may be wiser in buying some of the better second-class issues.

Debt No Longer Disgrace

As I write this column at my birthplace by the sea, I am forcibly reminded of the great change that has taken place since the World War in people's attitude toward debt. Only twenty-five years ago debt, like small pox, was something to avoid. Banks, schools, and parents encouraged savings. The goal of all was a bank account—even though it started at only one dollar. Mortgages were a disgrace.

Today, I find an entire change of sentiment here in the old city. Banks, schools and parents no longer encourage deposits. Debt is no longer shunned. Despite this change in attitude, I cannot believe that debt is any less dangerous today than it ever was. Yet, even in the face of this situation, I am optimistic on business for the near future. In fact, June industrial activity was considerably better than May. Moreover, July should be as good a business month as June. However, the changed attitude as to thrift and debt, if continued, makes me very fearful that we are heading into a terrible smash someday!

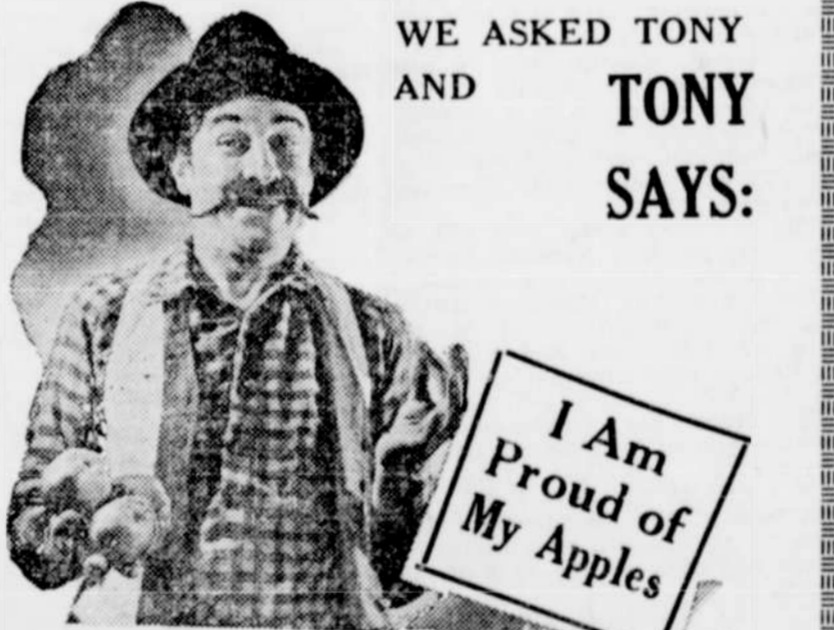
