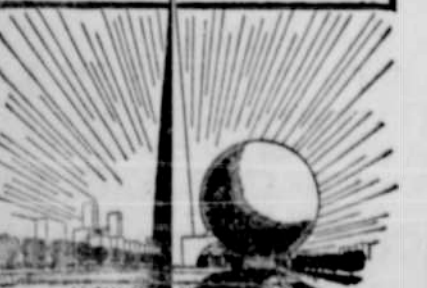

Two very worthwhile historical novels, "Drums" and "Marching On" by William Boyd, would not be difficult summer reading. "Drums" is a story of the American Revolution and "Marching On" is a Civil War novel. Mr. Boyd is a resident of North Carolina, and in explaining the natural talk of the characters in Drums says: "I had a tremendous advantage because I live in North Carolina and could just take the local speech. North Carolina is almost entirely Anglo-Saxon 98 1/2 per cent American born—and in the back districts has almost pure Colonial dialect. As I discovered by checking it up as much as I could with old diaries and letters, etc., of the Revolutionary period. I chose North Carolina as a setting for a Revolutionary novel because there is a better picture there than in any other state; its character has changed less than any other, since it has no important seaport."

Both these books are in the Community library and will add greatly to one's understanding of our two important periods of our history.
