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"STAY OUT OF WAR!"

American industry hates war. Its leaders and the rank and file of its membership have again and again reiterated the truth that wartime profits are largely fictitious, and do not repay the subsequent wreckage of a nation's entire economy. But with the big guns actually roaring in Europe, it is exceedingly timely and important to have industry's attitude made plain again.

Recently the National Association of Manufacturers went on record on this subject. We can do no better than to quote highlights from its statement, merely pointing out that the N.A.M. is the largest organization of industrial leaders in the country.

"American industry wants peace," the statement declares. "Peace is the life blood of progress. Peace must be the national objective. Industry's position on this matter has been stated repeatedly and there must be no misunderstanding about it."

"The United States can stay out of war."

"Emotionalism can betray us into war."

"A public will to peace, coupled with wise public policies and affirmative action to this end by our government will keep us out of war. A fatalistic attitude that war is inevitable for us is absurd. It presupposes that America cannot conduct itself intelligently to preserve peace and its own interests."

"Europe's problems do affect us, but our domestic problems still must come first."

"If yesterday industry was the only source of prosperity and reemployment, today it is as well the keynote of preparedness and peace. Under any conditions, America must depend on a smoothly functioning, efficient industrial system."

"Manufacturers will not relax their efforts to achieve and maintain sound improvement in our domestic economy."

At any rate in a war-torn world, where so many values are being lost or obscured, industry's position is plain. And it can be summed up in four foretold words that all Americans would do well to heed: "Stay out of war!"

it cancels the purchased securities, and thus cuts its total debt and total interest claims.

The result is that the foreign nation benefits itself at the expense of the American creditor who has become back. This practice, called "repatriation", cost American investors over \$2,000,000,000 in the last few years. European creditor nations have a clearing system that prevents this racket. For instance, up until the guns began to roar, Germany was paying on debts it owed to British and French citizens, but left Americans out in the cold. At least 20 foreign nations that owed money to United States citizens have been "repatriating" their bonds. There have been official and private protests; attempts to halt the practice by supervising the market and checking transactions, but nothing has been accomplished. The offenders are said to be Germany, Colombia, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Chile, Brazil, Hungary and Bolivia.

Nazis Worst Offenders

Germany has been, by all odds, the leader in the movement. It is said that her repurchases approached a quarter of a billion dollars. Chile and Brazil have repatriated over \$100,000,000 worth of bonds. While these governments refused to pay what they owed to American citizens, they have squandered billions on armaments. Here are several examples of how foreign bonds have fared since the World War:

The above figures are wholly apart from the indebtedness of the Allies to us for money borrowed during the last war. Taking no account of interest, these countries today owe us a total of twelve billion dollars in war debts. England and France are our biggest debtors. They owe us about four billion dollars apiece. This is our reward for "saving Democracy in 1917-18. It is one of the best arguments for us to keep out of "Round Two."

Keep Our Dollars Home

Hence, my advice is that readers should do their "digging for diamonds" in their own backyards. I am a staunch believer in diversification, but I beg you to seek it at home rather than abroad. It is difficult enough to keep posted on developments in North America without getting involved in the complicated foreign muddle. I have always opposed the purchase of all government bonds except those of Canada and the United States. Today, I am more opposed than ever to their purchase.

The Garden of Eden

On the supposition that the Garden of Eden narrative in Genesis describes a real country, any number of efforts have been made to establish its location, and many books have been written on the subject, often widely disagreeing. Some have located Eden near the town of Kurnah, in southern Babylonia, not far from the Persian gulf. This is at the junction of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers, in what is now the British mandatory kingdom of Iraq. Others have placed the Garden in Armenia, near the sources of these rivers. The region near Damascus, in Syria, has also been suggested; and some extremists have argued that it was in America, or Australia, or at the North Pole. The general opinion is that the description in the second chapter of Genesis refers to southern Babylonia.
