

League of Women Voters Meet

The opening meeting of the Washington County League of Women Voters was held Monday, September 25th at the Forest Hills golf club. Dr. G. E. Haugen of the University of Oregon Medical School, Portland, was introduced by the league president, Mrs. D. E. Towne, of Gaston. Dr. Haugen spoke on the subject of child guidance in Oregon and explained what is being done in this state along these lines. He stated that the amount of money appropriated by the legislature for this work was sufficient only to take care of the larger communities and he expressed the hope that the next legislature would provide a sufficient appropriation to establish child guidance clinics in most counties of the state so that all children who are in need of help can be taken care of.

A short business meeting followed during which committee chairmen reported on their plans for the year's work.

The national league urges support of revision of the "Neutrality" act by repeal of the present embargo section and substitution of provisions for control of all trade under restrictions of "cash and carry" or some similar proposal for trade that will tend to safeguard the United States. The league believes that such substitution will prove the best method to prevent our unpremeditated involvement in war.

BACK TO SCHOOL

Full of health and brown as berries the children troop back to their desks. Keep them that way with adequate lunches to supply energy for indoor tasks. Here are some luncheon dishes that will appeal to young appetites.

Spinach and Eggs au Gratin

1 pint cooked spinach
2 eggs
1 pint cream sauce
1/2 cup grated cheese
Cook and chop the spinach very fine, mix with well beaten eggs and cream sauce. Place in buttered casserole and cover with grated cheese. Bake in oven in pan of hot water until cheese is melted and brown. Serve with hot toast.

Sweet Potatoes with Apples

Select 4 large round sweet potatoes. Boil until tender. Core and pare 4 apples and cut in round slices. Place 1 slice of apple in each slice potato and sprinkle with brown sugar and salt. Dot generously with butter and place in oven to bake until apples are tender. Brown under broiler.

Luncheon Sandwich

1 tablespoon butter
1 1/2 tablespoon flour
1/2 pound cheese
3/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Salt, pepper, paprika
Melt butter, add flour. Add milk slowly, cook in double boiler and season. Add cheese. Pour mixture over broiled bacon and sliced tomatoes on toast.

Scraped Beef Balls

Wipe a small piece of steak cut from the top round. Lay on a board and scrape with the grain of the meat. Work first on one side and then on the other to remove the soft part of the meat, leaving nothing but the connecting tissues. Shape the meat into small balls. Broil 2 minutes. Season.
