The Orangemen of Beaverton defeated a scrappy but outclassed Sherwood eleven 26 to 0 on the local gridiron Friday night to move into a two way tie with Newberg for the lead in the T. Y. V. League Championship race.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Beavers came back in the second quarter to tally twice. Both touchdowns were made on line plunges by Gale Emmens. Both conversions tries were unsuccessful. In the third quarter "low gear" Van Houten intercepted a Sherwood pass on the bulldogs 33-yard line and galloped across the Sherwood goal unopposed for a touchdown. Dick Randall plunged the necessary two yards to make the conversion.

"Casey" Jones, Flashy Beaver half-back scampered around the end for six yards and pay dirt. A completed pass from "Casey" to Foster ended the scoring.

The rout of Sherwood was the 14th victory for the Beavers in T. Y. V. League competition. Since Armistice day 1937 when the Beavers defeated Forest Grove 13 to 6. They have held their league contemporaries scoreless.

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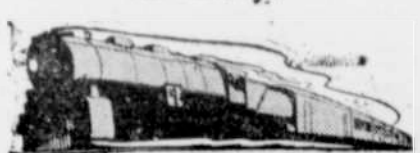
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
