AN IMPORTANT DISTINCTION

The recent indictment of the nominal head of the American Communist Party, Earl Browder, turns the spotlight upon the contrast between two ways of life and two habits of thought.

Browder has been indicted for traveling to Moscow on forged passports, an act which he frankly admitted in sworn testimony before the Dies Committee a short time ago. Now he is about to stand trial, protected by all the Constitutional rights that guarantee any citizen of this country, no matter how heinous his crime, a fair hearing.

Picture a similar situation if it had occurred under one of the systems under which these protections do not exist, and towards which Browder, if he had his way, would willingly drive this country. The victim would not receive an open and fair hearing but a star chamber proceeding, and as soon as the admission was drawn from him that he had used forged passports, the firing squad would be trotted out to do its work.

Yet, in this country where the rights of the individual are so jealously guarded, the followers of the Communist chief are even now complaining that he is being persecuted merely because he is a Red.

We trust—indeed, we know—that Browder will have his Constitutional right to a free trial. But it is more important to make the distinction, so frequently and easily neglected by the enemies of this country as soon as they happen to step out of bounds, between the just protection of citizens and their "right" to violate the country's laws in the interest of undermining the very Constitution to which they so brazenly appeal.

"A Family Orchard With Three Trees"

How can we make our home feel more like home? When we have our home conveniences outside as well as in the house.

When we have a house and some furniture we call it our home. But is our home complete without a lawn, flowers and trees? We usually fix up the front yard and forget the back. Wouldn't we enjoy a little fruit off our own trees? Of course, in the city or on a small place, there isn't much room for fruit trees, but we can usually find room for three trees.

For instance you can have early mid-summer and late apples, pears and quince grafted on one tree. By grafting the pears on the center limb and thus making it the leader and grafting the apples and quince on the remaining limbs will make an even well balanced tree. It isn't only the fruit we can enjoy but also the new and rarity of having three different kinds of fruit on one tree at the same time.

We can also graft several different kinds of cherries on one tree, for instance Bing, Lambert, Royal Ann and Black Republican. The first three are not self sterile so we need the Black Republican to make the tree self pollinating. That's why so many cherry trees don't produce the heavy crops it should produce, lacking the Black Republican as pollinator.

Then you could have one tree with pears, plums, peach, apricot and almond on it. They all grow on one tree. "Only be sure when you reach for a peach you don't pick a plum."

If you have an apple, pear, cherry, plum or etc., that don't bear, or has fruit on it you don't like, do not destroy it but have it grafted to any variety you want. Remember it takes years to develop a tree to any size. After the tree has been grafted it will start bearing again in two years.

The grafting is done early in the spring at the time the sap starts flowing, usually in about March or April, depending on the earliness of the season. Grafting wood should be cut in dormant time of season and kept in a cool place. Reasons for that is, sap in grafting wood should be more retarded than the tree you are going to graft on. Some of the nurseries already have trees with more than one kind of fruit on them especially cherry trees, but we will see more trees in the near future.

Wouldn't it be nice to have just a few trees so you could use all the fruit instead of having a lot of trees and letting it go to waste. This would be especially good for anyone having just a small yard and not enough space for very many trees. Let's enjoy our back yard as well as front for fruit, shade and ornament.

Diesel, Engine Inventor, Without Funds at Death

Dr. Rudolph Diesel was crossing the English channel on the night of September 29, 1913. He was going to London to attend a meeting of manufacturers, and to confer with the British admiralty, according to the Toronto Star Weekly.

It was ten o'clock when he said good-night to his friends and went to his stateroom. The next morning he did not appear. He was never seen again. His disappearance became an international sensation. When the war broke out there was a rumor that Diesel had been killed by the Germans to keep him from giving technical secrets to the British.

Rudolph Diesel was one of the greatest of inventors. His name has become a common noun; Diesel liners furrow the seven seas, Diesel trucks rumble along the highways, Diesel-powered planes criss-cross the skies, Diesel tractors plow our fields.

Behind the facade of Rudolph Diesel's confident manner, his big house in Munich, and his position of world renown, he was at the end of his rope. All his property was heavily mortgaged; he faced bankruptcy, to him an intolerable disgrace.

"If my friend Diesel had only said one word to me!" exclaimed Adolphus Busch, the St. Louis brewer. There were a dozen other men who would have helped him, but his stubborn pride forbade.

He had discussed methods of suicide with his son, Rudolph Jr., and the boy, never dreaming that his father was serious, said that he thought the best way was to jump off a fast-moving ship. When he left for England, his farewells were unaccountably affectionate.

Channel crossings are dismal affairs at best. He was alone after an evening of forced cheerfulness, and impending disaster loomed before him with double force. He went back on deck, and before him lay the dark, oblivious sea.

Over a week later, a Dutch boat pulled a body aboard. It was battered beyond recognition, and after removing the contents of the pockets, they dropped it overboard. Later a coin purse, a pocketknife, and a spectacle case were identified as Dr. Diesel's.

Education has always been an important factor in life. It has never ceased to be a vital one, regardless of class distinctions or material possessions. The goal of education has always been an idealistic one, and understood by educators and laymen alike. A glance at the weeks topics will show that this objective should be one of "Socialization."

H. C. Wells, in his work, "Outline of History," presents a salient paragraph concerning educational activities of the nineteenth century. Mr. Wells' sentiments may be applicable during the twentieth century. "The permanently effective task before mankind which had to be done before any new and enduring social and political edifice was possible, the task upon which the human intelligence is, with many interruptions, still engaged, was, and is, the task of working out and applying a Science of Property as a basis for freedom and social justice, a Science of Currency to ensure and preserve an efficiency of economic medium, a Science of Government and Collective Operations whereby in every community men may learn to pursue their common interests in harmony. A Science of World Politics, through which the stark waste and cruelty of warfare between races, peoples, and nations may be brought to an end and the

common interests of mankind brought under a common control, and, above all, a world-wide System of Education to sustain the will and interest of their common human adventures. The real makers of history in the nineteenth century, the people whose consequences will be determining human life a century ahead, were those who advanced and contributed to this fivefold constructive effort. Compared to them, the foreign minister and statesmen and politicians of this period were no more than a number of troubleshooters and occasionally incendiary schoolboys—and a few metal thieves—playing about and doing transitory mischief amidst the accumulating materials upon the site of a great building whose nature they did not (and do not) understand."

To offer evidence for his statements, Mr. Wells entitles his next phase in the development of mankind as the "Catastrophe of 1914."

It becomes necessary for us, all citizens of our glorious Nation and of the world, parents and teachers alike to dedicate our lives and services to the future of mankind. We can do this in our immediate neighborhoods, subscribing understanding and intelligent assistance to our young people. We can ensure and perpetuate the integrity of the American school by ridding it of provincialism and political cliques. The school must be acknowledged as a sacred institution, the temple of youth. Special privileges or immunities must, under no circumstances, be permitted to retard the fulfillment of the ideals enumerated. Our youth must be served.

Is the New Deal Thrifty?

The United States Treasury Department is an honest institution when it comes to publishing the financial record of the New Deal. It must make certain high New Dealers writhe in pain, though, when it puts before the taxpayers any such record as has been compiled by the New Deal in its spending of public monies.

The well nigh unbelievable fact is that in nearly six years, from January 1, 1934, to August, 1939, New Deal expenses have substantially topped tax income in every month but six. And four of these six months in which income did exceed expenses, were in March when income tax returns were due. Furthermore, the other two months of the six were months in which quarterly payments in income taxes were due.

That is a shocking state of affairs. In 68 months of taking in the public's money the New Deal spent more than they took in in all but six.

How long would you last if, for 62 pay days out of 68 you spent more than you earned? Is it any wonder that New Dealers are gleefully hailing the war? Anything, say they, to take your mind off such unmitigated double crossing of the trusting voters who put them in office.

If they can keep that smell out of the noses of the American public until after November, 1940, it will be one of the miracles of all time.

Stratford-on-Avon Still

Magnet for Americans

Unperturbed by the Shakespeare-Bacon controversy and its periodical revivals, the American visitor to Stratford-on-Avon, Shakespeare's birthplace, approaches not in controversial spirit, but with zeal and reverence. The number of visitors increases annually, and the proportion of Americans increases in proportion with the general total. The overseas tourist goes to Stratford as certainly as he goes to Westminster abbey, the Tower of London, or the National gallery.

Shakespeare's house is in excellent preservation. It was restored in 1847, and the work was done with such care that the timber framework remains unaltered, and the place must bear a close resemblance to that in which the poet resided.

The ground floor contains living room, kitchen, and a smaller room; up one flight of stairs is shown "the room in which Shakespeare was born." A few chairs, a table, and a bust of the poet furnish this room. There is an ancient fireplace and a timbered ceiling reminiscent of his time.

The walls are virtually covered with the signatures of visitors—Scott, Carlisle, Thackeray, Browning, and many others—but this tribute is no longer allowed. Here also is a Shakespeare museum, in which there are many memorials, including early editions of the plays, the Ely portrait and manuscripts addressed to the poet. The garden contains flowers and trees mentioned in the plays and poems.
