YOUTH HAS ITS EYES OPEN

"American young people have confidence in themselves, place real value in their talents, and have faith in the future of their country."

In these encouraging words, "Scholastic Magazine" announces the results of a survey it took recently among more than six thousand representative high school young people throughout the country. The conclusion should be heartening, but not genuinely surprising to anyone who has observed the American spirit in operation before.

Some of the answers, indeed, point to a courageousness and belief in the future that we older folk would do well to emulate. For instance, only 10 per cent of those questioned expressed the belief that government jobs should be provided for young people until times improve, and 61 per cent said that if they had trouble finding jobs they would blame themselves.

As a further comment, 90 per cent of the young men and women questioned believe that the best cure for unemployment among youth and for young people in jobs they don't fit is more preparation for specialized jobs.

This note of encouragement comes at an apt moment. For with industry once again on the move and already reporting serious shortages among the applicants for skilled jobs in some brackets, youth is shown displaying a confidence that will take advantage of these new opportunities, and that augurs well for the future of America.

RALPH H. CAKE



Ralph H. Cake, prominent Portland civic leader, partyworker and businessman, filed late yesterday with Secretary of State Earl Snell for the office of Republican national committeeman.

Cake is a native of Portland where he was born in 1891 absorbed Republican doctrines under the tutoring of his father, the late Judge W. M. Cake, while attending Portland grade and high schools and the University of Oregon where he graduated in 1913. He finished his education by taking law at Harvard and returned to Oregon to join his father's firm. In school he joined the Phi Gamma Delta which he has since served as national officer. He is a past president of the University of Oregon Alumni association. He is a member of numerous fraternal and civic organizations and was president of the highly successful 1938 Rose Festival.

Cake was married in 1916 to Gretchen Sherwood of Coquille and they have two children, Martha and Ralph Jr.

Since the death of his father Cake has been associated in law practice with Lamar Toose and Nicholas Jauregui. He is also president of the Equitable Savings & Loan association. His extensive legal contacts require frequent trips east and has resulted in making political contacts there which his friends feel can be of value to Oregon. Always active in local politics Cake was chairman of the finance committee for the recent Lincoln day program in Portland which featured Thomas E. Dewey.

Sears-Roebuck Co. Gives \$2500 for OSC Scholarships

A gift of \$2500 in cash to provide 25 \$100 scholarships for entering freshmen in agriculture has just been granted to Oregon State college by Sears-Roebuck and company, according to William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture.

The scholarships will be handled on much the same basis as others sponsored by this same company in more than 30 states. The idea was started in the southern states by General R. E. Wood, former president and now chairman of the board, as a means of helping land grant colleges develop agricultural leadership among boys otherwise unable to attend college.

The recipients of the scholarships are to be named at large through the state by an O.S.C. committee which will set up its own basis of selection. The experience in other states has been that most of the boys chosen are those who have excelled in 4-H club and Future Farmer activities, although membership in either of these organizations is not in any wise a requirement, it was pointed out.

The \$100 cash grant in this state will practically cover the yearly fees here at Oregon State. It amounts to considerably more than a state board scholarship.

Dean Schoenfeld and other leaders in the school of agriculture expressed keen appreciation over the granting of the scholarships in this state. They said that experience with similar grants made by other companies has shown that many country boys otherwise unable to attend college have, through such aid, started a college career which resulted in their becoming outstanding graduates who have gone out into important positions of leadership.

Though no definite commitments are made in advance, it is understood that an equal amount will be given annually by the company in support of these scholarships. First appointments will be for the year 1940-41 under rules to be announced soon.

Origin of Easter

Easter, this year, is on March 24, almost as early as it can possibly be according to the method of establishing the day, and the earliest it has been in a quarter of a century. As we doubtless all know, Easter may come as early as March 22 or as late as April 25, the date regulated by the full moon and the Council of Nicea being responsible for that reckoning. By that agreement Easter comes on the first Sunday after the first full moon that occurs after the vernal equinox but which may vary anywhere from March 20 to March 22. This year the vernal equinox occurs on March 20, 1:23 p. m.

It was in 1913 that Easter fell on March 23, only one day earlier than this year. In 1916 it came on April 23, within two days as late as it possibly could have been. In 1919 it was fairly late, April 20. Only three times since 1910, except this year, has Easter come in March.—Sheridan Sun

Polhemus Succeeds Griffith as President Of P.E.P. Company

1936, retiring as General Manager of the Port of Portland to become Executive Vice-President of Portland Electric Power Company and its affiliates. Simultaneously he was appointed by Governor Martin as a Commissioner of the Port of Portland. Mr. Polhemus continues as a member of the Board of Directors of Portland Electric Power Company as well as the Portland General Electric Company.

Mr. Polhemus is a son of the late James Suydam Polhemus, pioneer engineer in the development of river and harbor improvements in Oregon, at Galveston, Texas, and New Orleans. It was Mr. Polhemus's father who made the first hydrographic survey of the Great Lakes, and after 52 years of active service with the Army Engineers and in a civil capacity, he retired in 1924. The modern jetty in river and harbor improvement work is a monument to his engineering foresight and skill. It was the elder Mr. Polhemus who initiated the jetty work at Coos Bay and Yaquina in Oregon, and the Yaquina construction was the first of its kind upon the Pacific Coast.

Mr. Griffith, as a young lawyer in Oregon City, joined the company's predecessor as division counsel in 1894 and named associate general counsel in 1900 and general attorney in 1909. He became President of Portland Electric Power Company and all its affiliates in 1913. During his service he saw the old Portland General Electric Co. consolidate with the railways organizations and become the Portland Railway Light & Power Company and later emerge as Portland Electric Power Company, which still exists as a local holding company, and the recreation of the Portland General Electric Company as the operating electric utility company in 1930. Prior to coming to Oregon Mr. Griffith, who is a native of Minneapolis, attended Oakland (California) Academy and began his business career in 1889 as a clerk with the California Paper Company in San Francisco, being transferred to Oregon City in 1890, and studied law while so employed in the paper industry.

The evening before Mr. Griffith retired as President of the Portland General Electric Company he was a guest of honor at a large birthday dinner attended by several hundred citizens, at Arlington club.

The Worlds Three Graces in Garden Shrubs

These with homes that need shrubs for the garden can well afford to read these lines for there is profit in doing it.

Shrubs do make the home look like a beauty spot if rightly chosen and they also give jungle effects when the selection is unwise. To be getting the full benefit of landscape beauty one had best observe the nature and behavior of the shrubs to be used and if that is done one soon finds that certain kinds of shrubs grow slowly and grow in beauty and charm year after year but very gradually. The fast growing kinds soon are out of all proportion to a given space and often look ridiculous besides spoiling the surrounding plants so that they become a liability to garden charm.

This fact is often overlooked because they are comparatively inexpensive kinds that nurserymen often have to spend from 5 to 10 years in producing a good salable bush, such as is the case with Azaleas, Rhododendrons and Camellias. These three sorts of evergreen shrubs are very slow to start and often many years are needed to make a good plant. What justifies that effort by Nurserymen to produce these high quality shrubs is chiefly in the fact that the customer who buys them gets something that will become more beautiful year after year and have an ever increasing value by itself and further by the influence it yields on the desirability of the whole garden.

Who would not recognize the merit of a garden planted with choice Camellias, Rhododendrons and Azaleas for often each bush gets to be worth perhaps ten times its original cost. The wisdom in choosing wisely when planting soon becomes apparent and a Nurseryman naturally takes pride in knowing such plants very well and offering only those that are truly fine. The Democratic party, overwhelmingly victorious in two elections, presented a strange picture in refusing to set an earlier date for its national convention.

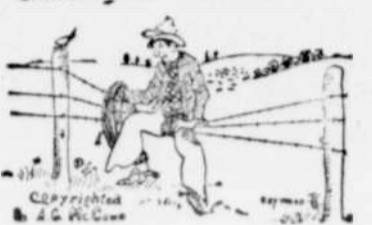
