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THE UNWELCOME GUEST

A former official in the United States Treasury was recently quoted to the gloomy effect that government is about a twenty per cent partner in all business. In other words, government through its power to tax has made itself the fifth member of every company's board of directors, the silent partner, the unwelcome guest who eats off the extra plate that is set for each meal by every family in the land.

It is a disconcerting thought that one out of every five dollars earned by the sweat and toil of average Americans everywhere goes automatically to government. And the more evidence in the case continues to pile up, the more it begins to look as though any revision of the Treasury official's estimate will have to be in an upward direction.

Now a careful study into the tax situation conducted by the state of Wisconsin puts more of the real and painful facts on the table. The Wisconsin study shows that in 1938 the 7,800 corporations in that state paid \$1,158,743 in taxes to various units of government, and that these taxes represented \$20,606,913 more than those same corporations earned as a result of their own business operations. In other words, when John Smith establishes his own business these days, in the interest of accuracy, the sign on the door ought to read as follows: Government, Government, Government, and Smith, Incorporated.

The same type of survey could probably be repeated, yielding the same or even more disquieting results, in almost every state of the union. It points once again to the flood-like ravages of wasteful government spending. And it shows forcefully how the productive viding goods at low prices in order to pour taxes, taxes and still abilities of this country are being turned away from the job of pro-

Mrs. Coleman lived in Beaverton many years ago and attended the grade school here. Interment Union cemetery at Cedar Mills.

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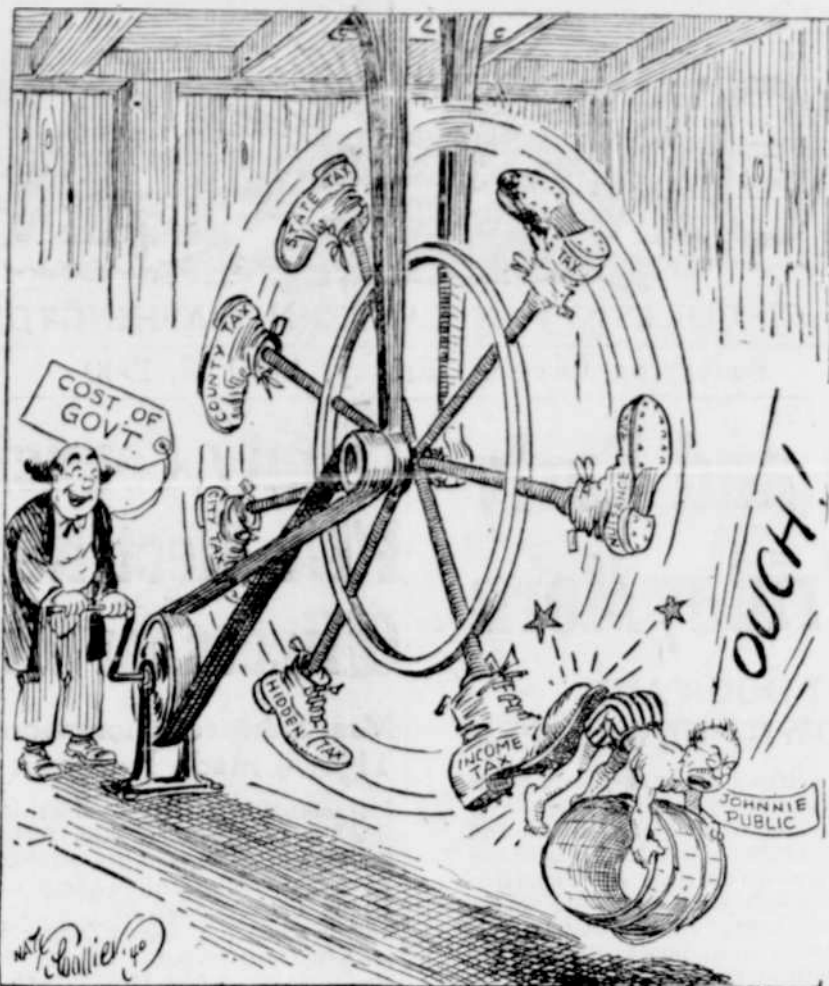
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IN THE GARDEN

The time for dreaming thru seed catalogues is now definitely past! April is here with her weather moods and we must "make garden when the sunshines," yes, and even when it doesn't too, for that matter, if we are to accomplish what "must," be done this month in the garden in order to insure lovely and satisfying surroundings throughout the coming spring and summer.

Clean up is still very much in order. Rake up leaves, prunings, etc., and pile on the compost heap. Divide Chrysanthemums, Shasta Daisies and other hardy perennials. Phlox may be cut across with a sharp spade in two or four parts and replanted. Plant hardy perennials and annuals, but be sure the plants have been hardened off properly since being taken out of the greenhouse.

Roses may still be planted and give abundant bloom this summer if proper care is given. Don't spade rose beds deeper than three inches near the plants or you may cut the roots and set the plants back a great deal or ruin them.

First plantings of gladioli may be made any day soon. Early planted gladioli are blooming before the thrip are busy.

Pull dead leaves off the Iris. Dust with sulphur or sulphur and roton to check leafspot and destroy gophers which have hatched out, before they dig their way into the iris leaves.

Pick spent blooms from Pansies, Violas and Dorotheas.

All shrubs should be set out as soon as possible. They need the cool moist days of spring to get established.

Watch for the migratory birds and get bird houses up at once if you have not already done so. The Violet Green Swallow returned several weeks ago. The Blue Birds are already nest building. The Purple Finches (little gray-brown birds with red-orange heads) have remained all winter this year as have the Flickers, Woodpeckers, Robins, Juncos, English and Song Sparrows. The Meadow Lark has wintered here and often bled a gloomy day with his cheery song.

All in all April is a month of enthusiasm for all who love their gardens. Do tell? Ouch! my back.

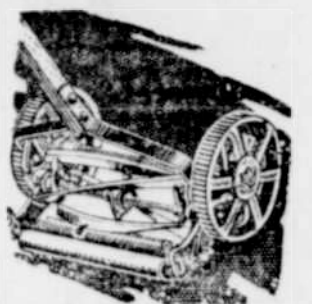
