In remodeling homes it is frequently possible to install accordion-type doors where there is not sufficient space for the swing area required by the regular type door.

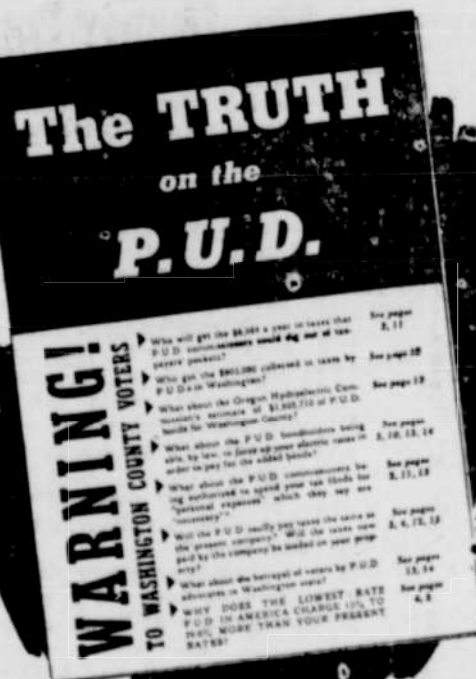
