Scholls Co-operative Berry Growers, Inc., have sold their 1940 blackcap crop to R. C. Bodle company. Buyers from various other concerns submitted bids ranging from 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cents. The Scholls growers control approximately 130 acres of blackcaps with an estimated tonnage from 150 to 200. No definite price was set for the pickers, growers failing to agree on one set scale.

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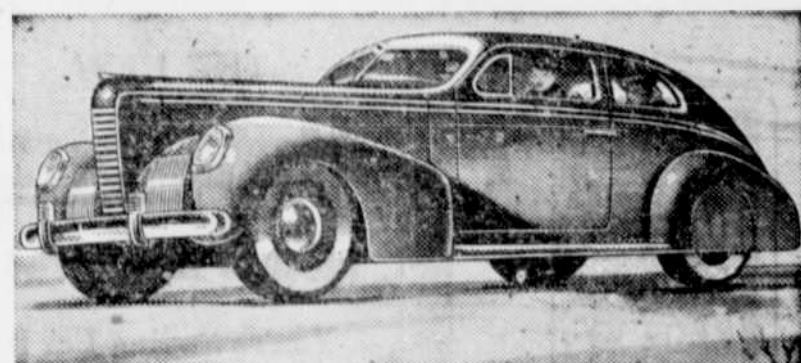
