PROCEDURE AFTER ELECTION

1. Organize by choosing a president, one vice-president, one treasurer and one secretary.
2. Bond their treasurer and other officers as the board directs.
3. By ordinance provide for the division of the district into five subdivisions and fix the boundaries.
4. Adopt rules to govern its meetings and provide that all legislative sessions shall be open to the public.
5. All legislative acts of the board must be expressed written resolutions and all are subject to referendum.
6. Provide for the levy of taxes for a period of 10 years not exceeding two mills in any one year nor more than 10 mills in ten years for the purpose of meeting preliminary expenses of organizing the district, but no part of these taxes levied for the purpose of paying either principal or interest on any revenue bonds which must be paid solely from revenues of the business after all other expenses are paid. Non will anymore taxes be levied than is absolutely necessary for organization purposes. Furthermore, every dollar of taxes paid over to the commission of the People's Utility District is to be returned to the general fund of the county just as soon as they are available from the revenues of the People's Utility District.
7. Provide for the acquisition, either by purchase or condemnation, construction or lease of necessary properties to carry out the provisions of the act; to provide for the issue of revenue bonds, their sale, and submission of the question of their issue to a referendum vote of the people, said bonds to be sold at public sale to the highest bidder, according to the terms of the law.
8. Employ a competent experienced power executive to manage and be responsible for efficient operation of the system.
9. Supervise and regulate utilities, fixing rates sufficient to cover expenses, including principal, interest, taxes, etc.
10. Adopt effective uniform system of accounting prescribed by the Federal Power Commission, according to the provisions of the law.
11. Provide for an annual audit and an annual report to be filed according to the provisions of the law.
12. Provide for the employment of labor pursuant to the provisions of the Oregon State Code, establishing a minimum scale of wages, arbitration, etc.
13. Provide for the dissolution of the district, when considered necessary, either by their own motion or by petition of the voters and dispose of the property and funds according to the provisions of the law.

The resale rates that will be adopted will be the Bonneville Standard Resale Rates such as Forest Grove already has in force.

Each and every step of the above procedure will be taken after obtaining the advice and counsel of the Bonneville Project.

The reduction in the rates that we now have has been brought about solely through the threat of the Bonneville Project and the People's Utility District. Any tax levied to finance the beginning of a People's Utility District will be saved many times over in service charges made. In fact, the mere thought of a People's Utility District is saving the people of Oregon over a \$1,335,000 annually.
