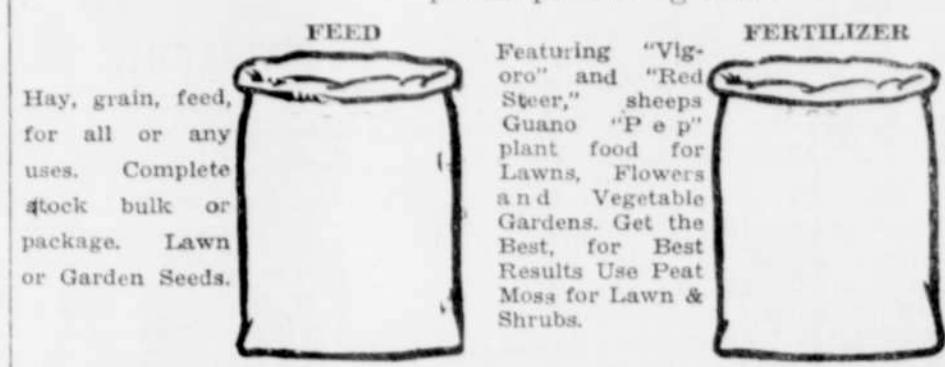

Worthwhile donations have been recently contributed to Saint Mary's Seminary by the students of St. Mary's School, Stayton, and of St. Mary's of the Valley.

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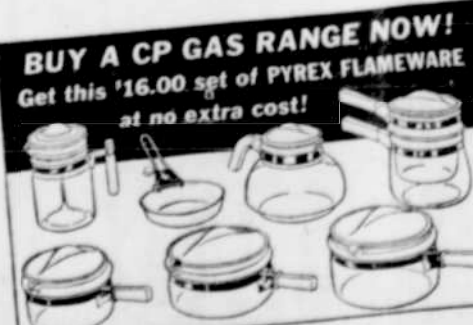
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
