Development of Ideas

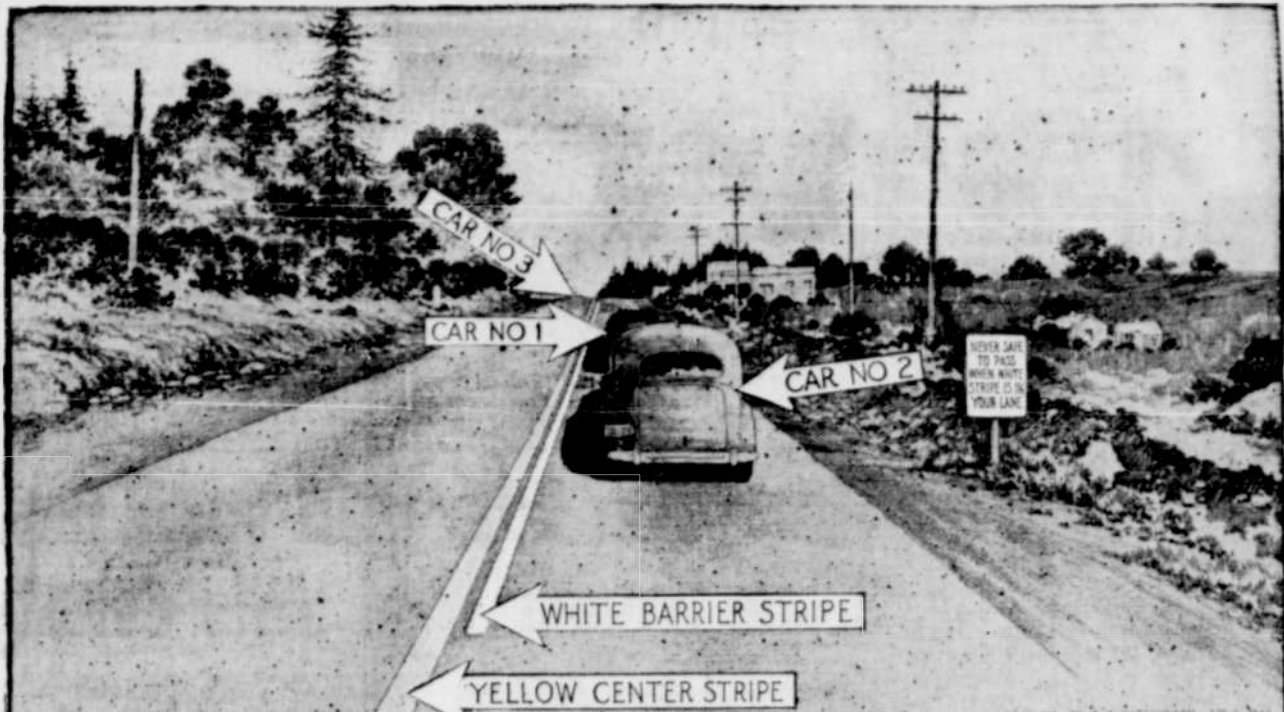

Grecian Monks Use U. S. Flour

Monks of Mount Athos, Greece, are now using American flour exclusively in their celebrated monastery, exercising one of the privileges which have made them a law unto themselves for centuries. Being exempt from import duties, they find it cheaper to buy from the United States the 300 tons of flour they consume annually rather than purchase their supply in the home market. The flour is imported by means of special permits while the necessary foreign exchange is provided by the Bank of Greece in Athens.

Tin Roof Treatments

Most roofing authorities recommend that the tin roof be painted immediately upon installation and every two years thereafter. In cases where galvanized sheet metal is used, the roof should not be painted for at least six months after installation, as this period of conditioning is necessary to free the surface from acids which otherwise may tend to loosen the paint. Peeling paint should be removed with steel wool, sandpaper, or a wire brush before new paint is applied.

Highway Widening Plan Heard by State Board

A petition bearing signatures of 200 persons in Washington county interested in the widening of the Tualatin Valley highway from the city limits of Portland to Forest Grove, was presented to the state highway commission at a recent meeting. Accompanying the petition was a resolution pointing out the hazards of the present narrow highway, the increased travel which followed opening of the Wolf Creek route, the prospect of ever increasing travel on the road and the fact that right of way for widening the extreme eastern section of the highway from the county line to Beaverton has already been acquired. The commission took the proposal under advisement.

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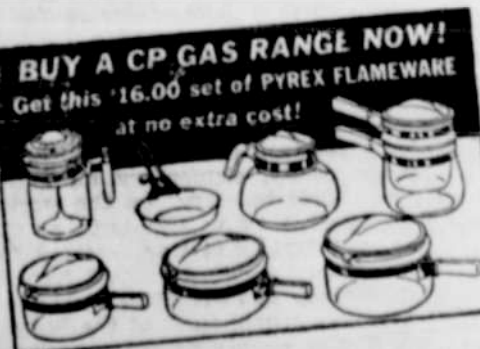
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
