Graduation was held Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

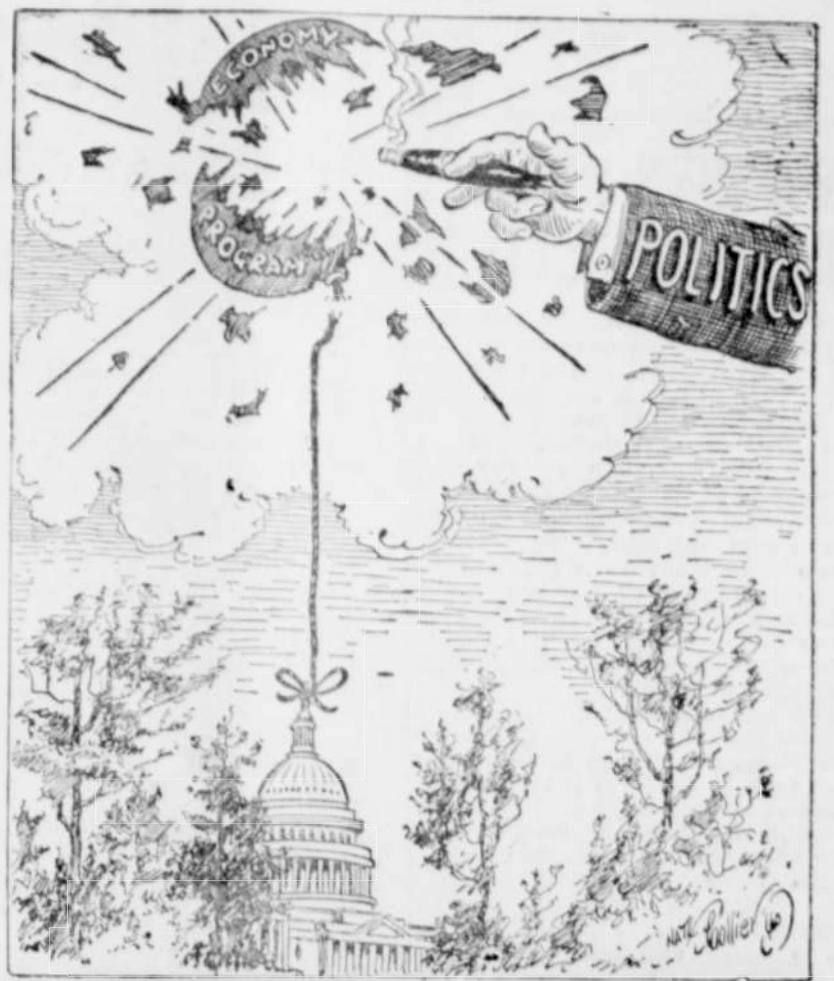
The school picnic was held at Washington Park Friday, May 17.
