NEW TIRE TREAD SAVES MANY LIVES

First, it has a perforated, six room, non-skid block design and secondly it has an exclusive, quick-stopping device which places on the ground more than 2,500 extra sharp gripping edges. These edges, or 'grippers,' greatly increase the stopping power, because the instant the car brakes are applied, the 'grippers' go into play, bite through slippery road film, and bring the car to a quick, safe, straight-line stop.

"An added and important feature of this new principle of tread design, or 'brake-action' tread, is the fact that, as the miles pile up, the gripping edges become more pronounced and, in addition, retain their keenness by literally sharpening themselves against the pavement."

Fife and Drum Music Formerly Used in Army

Fifes and drums stirred the hearts of Americans when our forefathers went forth to fight the battles of the Revolution, displaying the sort of patriotic pride so admirably depicted in the "Spirit of 1776."

Long after the Revolution the shrill tones of the fife, with its accompanying drum-beats, supplied the rhythm for the measured tread of marching men, remaining in favor for about a hundred years.

It was not until 1875 that the army discontinued the use of the fife and adopted the trumpet, mainly with a view to signaling field units too far distant to hear the more subdued tones of the fife. Six years later the U. S. marine corps also discarded the shrill-toned instrument for the keyless trumpet, or bugle.

But this change did not come about without some protests from grizzled old fifers. Continental marines had used fifes to attract recruits and had further stimulated a fervent patriotism by painting coiled rattlesnakes on their drums.

Fifes had been an established musical instrument in marine units since 1775.

Even when a school was established for their instruction at the marine barracks, Washington, the fifers still tried in every way to continue to use their fifes. Finally it was directed that no fifer would be permitted to re-enlist without a written agreement that he would learn to blow a trumpet.

In former years the captain of each naval vessel prescribed the calls blown on his ship and marine drummers and fifers were required to be familiar with them. For example, "Annie Laurie" might be played for morning colors, and "Auld Lang Syne" for retreat.

Nowadays the American Legion has done much to popularize the trumpet by organizing drum and trumpet corps, thus bringing into prominence this stimulating type of martial music.
