Babson Draws Lesson For United States

Charleston, S. C., June 7.—Without doubt these are the most critical days in at least a century of world history. Only a few weeks ago the Allied generals were talking about that "crazy paper hanger" in Germany. Even the London Times which arrived here a short time back discussed the peace terms which England would inflict on Germany when Hitler was mopped up.

When recently talking with our high government officials, they told me that the French army was invincible. They admitted the War might be a long struggle, but insisted that no army could whip the French. They stated that it was the largest, most completely equipped army in the world. They also spoke in highest terms of its commanders and especially of the French strategists. Certainly it makes one lose confidence in army officials to see what has taken place only a few weeks after such statements. For evidence, read The Congressional Record and the report of committee hearings.

Marginot Line Like Chinese Wall
What has happened to this "invincible" army is now known to everyone. Many are asking the hows and whys of what has recently occurred. The simple truth is that Germany has developed and used an entirely new form of warfare. As this new technique has been explained to readers by other writers, I will not go into details. The great Marginot Line, built at the expense of a billion dollars during the past twenty years seems as obsolete as the Chinese Wall. Get this point, however: The German successes have been due to the willingness of the Allies to depend upon their prestige, material wealth, and "what licked Germany before."

There is still time for the Allies to turn the tide or at least stop the German advances. The War is not hopeless for Great Britain. It is true that the Germans control one side of the English Channel but England still controls the other side. It is true that London is now only a few miles from Germany's new air fields, but it is likewise true that these German air bases are only a

A garden hint for the month is: Do not trim Moss Rose bushes except to remove suckers and dead wood. All rose bushes infested with Black Spot should be dusted with white Sulphur. Control is by constant dusting and should be applied when the air is quiet, preferably in the early morning. The spores of Black Spot fungus winter over in the earth, it is, therefore necessary to keep the soil as clean as possible by gathering up all infested leaves and burning them.

Now is a good time to overhaul the pool. Clean out thoroughly, dividing the water plants and replanting with fresh earth and fertilizer. If you are bothered with mosquitoes around your pool, get a gold fish and let it be the Mosquito cure.

Remember Sunday the 9th at the Penning home. A tour through the rose garden, with interesting information on growing and care of roses will be the first feature after dinner. Be sure to come.

Marine Corps Recruiting Office Enlisting Men in Unlimited Number in June

The United States Marine Recruiting office in the U. S. Court House at Portland has been authorized to accept an unlimited number of men for enlistment during the month of June according to word received today from Captain James B. Hagg, officer in charge of Marine Corps Recruiting activities in the Portland district.

This, Captain Hardie stated, is due to the fact that Congress has authorized the expansion of the Marine Corps to 34,000 enlisted men, its greatest peace time strength. Due to this great increase, promotion will be faster than it has been at any time during the past 20 years, the Captain said.

Branch recruiting offices are being opened at Boise, Idaho, and Walla Walla, Washington, to help in handling the increase.

Male United States citizens between the ages of 18 and 30, without dependents, of good habits and character, and in good health, are eligible for enlistment.

Five Beaverton Students Receive Diplomas From The Oregon State College

Five students from Beaverton and one from Garden Home are among the 793 who have completed their course at Oregon State College and are receiving their degrees this June. They represent the schools of education, forestry and engineering.

These graduates are members of the largest group ever to receive degrees in one class at Oregon State. Requirements for the bachelors degree at the seventy-first annual commencement June 3 have been completed by 718. In addition 70 master's, three professional and four doctor of philosophy degrees bring the total for this year to 793 earned degrees plus four honorary awards. Last year a previous record total of 685 were conferred.

Harold John Peterson, Ralph Emerson Walker and Tension Walker of Beaverton were among 138 receiving bachelors degrees in the school of engineering. Harold Scott Huff is included in the 56 education graduates. John William Mason, Beaverton, and Melvin Romayne Aitken, Garden Home, are two of 94 forestry graduates. Other school groups being graduated include nursing education 8, science 61, agriculture 144, home economics 108, pharmacy 17 and secretarial science 90. An even larger percentage of the graduates than usual have positions waiting for them, deans report.

In addition to those graduating, Beaverton has been represented this year by 18 students. These include the following: freshmen, John M. Barnes and William Maxwell Mear, agriculture; Veldon Cecil Boge, forestry; Frances Fitz Brindell, secretarial science; John Ralph Huff and Donald Ray Short, lower division.
