Hidden Village Sales 50 Per Cent Ahead

Indicative of the home construction activity in the West Slope district was a reported 53 new meters installed in the West Slope water district since January 1. One of the attractive sites in the vicinity is Hidden Village, a development by A. F. Spaulding in the Multnomah Country club tracts. Spaulding reported every house in his development is covered by a 90 per cent FHA insured mortgage loan.

May Sales were 50 per cent ahead of April sales in Hidden Village. Development of a street system, with 50-foot right of way has been made. Two new houses are under construction in Hidden Village, and three others are planned immediately.

S. P. Will Operate New Economy Train

A new economy train, the "Beaver" first of its kind to operate in the Pacific Northwest, will be placed in daily service between Portland and San Francisco for the summer months beginning June 8, it was announced today by J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent for Southern Pacific company.

The new train will be for coach and tourist passengers exclusively, Ormandy said. Southern Pacific's lowest fares will be good on the train and the dining car will feature breakfasts for 25c, luncheon 30c and dinner 35c. It will carry modern air-conditioned equipment consisting of chair cars with comfortable reclining seats, tourist Pullman cars and a full-

length lounge car for tourist passengers.

Schedule of the Beaver will be almost as fast as the famous Cascade according to Ormandy. The south bound train will leave Portland at 5:45 p. m. and arrive in San Francisco at 1:55 p. m. the next day. North bound the Beaver will leave San Francisco at 6:40 p. m. arriving in Portland at 3:50 p. m. the following day. Schedule both north and south bound provides a close connections with trains to and from Seattle and other Pacific Northwest points.

The train is being placed in service to accommodate extremely heavy rail travel which is in prospect for the summer season on account of the San Francisco World's Fair, according to Ormandy. With its inauguration Southern Pacific will have four trains daily in each direction between Portland and San Francisco.

Other economy type trains operated by the Southern Pacific have proven highly popular, Ormandy said. These include the Coaster between San Francisco and Los Angeles; the Californian between Los Angeles and Chicago and the San Francisco Challenger between San Francisco and Chicago. When the Beaver goes into service it will be possible to go from Portland to Chicago via California with economy train service all the way.

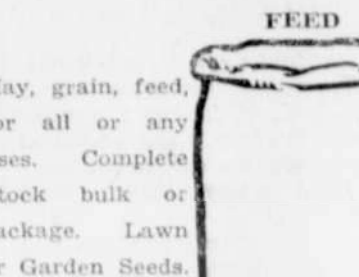
