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Choose Between Guns or Gadgets

Babson Says We Must Choose Between Real And Fake Security

Babson Park, Mass., June 28—The big issue facing America today is: Real Security vs. Fake Security. Everyone now realizes that this country must annually spend billions of dollars on defense. Yet, for ten years the United States has failed to balance its budget, due to relief, farm aid, and so-called "social security" costs. We cannot add the defense billions to the relief billions. We must choose between guns and gadgets; between personal or "social" security. With defense expenditures rising, "New Deal" expenditures must be slashed.

When I was in Europe two years ago, some of Hitler's aides prophesied accurately that he had the power to push the Allies around while they were unwilling to strip for the real fight. England finally stripped, as shown by the recent dictatorship, and at last decided to "come out fighting." France took the same path but faced dictatorship with reluctance, even when the situation became desperate. She clung to the 3-hour day as a sop to labor and retained three per cent interest for investors, crushing the middle class as between the jaws of a vise. England and France saw the need of getting guns, but refused to give up "gadgets."

Delay Was Suicidal

The Allies' weak, stupid, and stubborn delay in resorting to self-sufficiency had the effect of disarming the democracies. Two precious, priceless years were lost, wasted in dilly-dallying and delusions that security somehow could be won without paying the price. We live today in a world where no nation has the privilege of choosing between free and easy indulgence and resolute devotion to duties. The only alternative is between dictation by force from without and self-discipline developed from within.

The cold realism of what the Germans told me about the Allies has a ruthless application to America today. Just as England and France were at last driven to strip for the necessities of warfare, so the United States will be driven to strip for the necessities of defense. Any other policy on our part will give us only "phony" defenses, fit only for phony wars. Recent history gives proof that any country which makes ready merely for military defense is preparing itself for defeat. Hope of security demands also the upbuilding of national character into more heroic stature.

Never forget that here in the United States we must be prepared for the possibility that the Axis powers, including Japan, will gang up against America. We must take steps not only to protect ourselves against infiltration, or the secret sapping of our strength by fifth columns, but must revamp our attitude toward leisure, waste, and behavior. Tanks, planes, battleships and other material armor can be built in less time than it takes to erect moral defenses and rearm the national spirit. This means that a spiritual awakening must accompany any successful defense program; and that such effort should start at once.

If the Germans listened to our Presidents' fireside talk of several weeks ago they were uneasy when

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County Agent Informs Apple-Pear Growers to Use Second Cover Spray

Apple and pear growers should apply the second cover spray this week, according to an announcement of W. F. Cyrus, county agent. E. G. Thompson, associate entomologist of the Oregon experiment station reports that brood moths have been in flight the past few days and that eggs have been laid. Spray should be applied before these eggs hatch.

Mr. Thompson in discussing this spray, makes the following statements:

"The recommended spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem, two pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give control.

"Calcium arsenate as been used successfully in the Willamette valley for codling moth control. Tests carried on by the Entomology Department of the Oregon experiment station over a period of seven years indicate that under Willamette valley conditions calcium arsenate is only slightly less effective than lead arsenate in codling moth control.

"Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage, as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution if worm injury is to be prevented. Special care should be taken in spraying the upper portion of the tree, as more than half of the codling moth eggs are laid in the upper third of the tree."

He relieved Chet Davis, ex-baseballer, in the first inning after the Beaverton Club had scored nine runs, and in spite of numerous errors on the part of his team, held the opposition to eight unearned runs the remainder of the game.

Some of the Beaverton players gave the visiting West Slopers the nickname of West Slo before the game, but after the game was ended, and the Beavers had gone down to defeat the regular name of West Slope was reinstated.

Happy Days Start Jul. 2 at Hillsboro

Varied Program Offers Fine Entertainment For the Whole Family

Boasting a wider variety of attractions than ever before, the 1940 edition of Hillsboro's far-famed Happy Days celebration will launch its three-day program on Tuesday, July 2, continuing through the Fourth with exciting events crammed into every hour.

Known as the biggest old-time Fourth of July celebration in the northwest, Happy Days this year will feature—in addition to carnival rides and concessions—midget auto races and evening, free shows, every day with five thrilling acts on the program, races and games with \$35 in prizes offered to winners, baseball games every day, dancing every night a Fourth of July parade offering \$100 in prizes, patriotic exercises, free band concerts and a mammoth fireworks display on the night of the Fourth.

Admission to Shute park, scene of the annual three-day celebration, will be free. Plenty of shade, picnic tables and outdoor stoves will await those who may care to pack lunches, bring the family, and make a day of it. Ample free parking space for out-of-town cars will be provided.

The afternoon of Wednesday, July 3, has been set aside as Kiddies Day, with all carnival rides selling at a uniform price of five cents for children 12 years of age and under. The low prices will prevail from 1 p. m. until 6 o'clock.

Coronation of the Goddess of Liberty traditional ruler, over Happy Days events, will be held in the spacious Shute park dance pavilion on Tuesday night, July 2, and dancing will start immediately after the coronation lasting until midnight.

Novelty races and sports events offering \$35 in prizes to winners will be held on the midget speedway at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday with admission free to the public. Sited in the program are pie-eating, rolling pin and crack-eating contests, bicycle and tri-cycle races in several divisions for boys and girls pole climbing and buck saw contests and many others.

Firm Declares 30th Dividend

Expect Merger Plans of Two Loan Associations Complete in Next Month

The Washington Savings and Loan Association Hillsboro, Oregon, and its companion institution the Tualatin Valley Federal Savings and Loan Association have just announced the 30th consecutive dividend since the organization of the senior institution in 1925. This association thus continues its unbroken record of regular dividends since it was organized. The dividends are at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum.

Both of the Hillsboro Associations report the year just closing as the greatest year in their history. During the year they have financed the construction of dozens of houses in Hillsboro and vicinity and have made a large volume of loans for the purpose of refinancing existing mortgages and for purchase of homes.

J. M. Person general manager of both associations reporting to the respective boards, said that interest rates continues the lowest in the history of the associations and that there is no prospect in the immediate future for any advance in rates. "One of the peculiarities of loans in contrast with loans made ten or fifteen years ago," said Mr. Person, "is the fact that less than 5% of home construction has been for speculative purposes." "In other words, 95% of the homes built were constructed for the sole purpose of use by the builder as a home."

The directors found that after declaring dividends it left a substantial sum to be added to the reserves of the institutions and thereby further strengthen and stabilize the institutions to better serve the community.

The associations are now in process of being merged and will be operating as a single institution when the merger is completed, which is expected within the next 30 days.

Announce Street Lighting Rates

Charges Coincide with Those of Municipally-Owned Electric Systems

Electricity for street lighting will be made available to cities and towns served by Portland General Electric Company at charges identical with those now made by the municipally-owned electric systems of Forest Grove and Canby, James H. Polhemus, PGE president, announced this week.

Polhemus expressed his hope that the substantial savings to cities represented by this company's new street-lighting policy will be used to make communities in this area the best-lighted in the entire country, and the safest from after-dark crimes and traffic accidents.

The TVA's standard street lighting schedule was used as a pattern in making up the new PGE street lighting schedules. Electricity for street lighting will be cheaper than in TVA, however, and will follow exactly the standard set by the Bonneville administration when it signed its contracts with Forest Grove and Canby. The Forest Grove and Canby schedules are: 3 cents for the first 150 kilowatt-hours per month 2 cents for the next 350 kilowatt hours and 1 cent for excess kilowatt hours above 500.

Like the TVA schedule, the new PGE schedule provides for varying situations where cities desire the power company to provide street lighting equipment and its maintenance, or where they desire to acquire and maintain their own facilities in whole or in part.

In negotiating new street lighting contracts Polhemus said, every effort will be made to encourage the municipalities to acquire and maintain their own street lighting systems. "We will provide, free of charge, expert advice from qualified lighting engineers to any municipality desirous of purchasing a new and modern street lighting system, and the company stands ready to sell to cities concerned the street lighting systems which the company now owns," he stated.

If a particular city owns its own street lighting circuits and fixtures, provides its own lamp renewals and other maintenance costs, and has its own poles and standards for carrying the circuits and fixtures, its contract will cover only an energy charge for the actual amount of electricity used, Polhemus explained.

If, however, the city is not desirous of investing in a street lighting system its contract will include an investment charge. If the company has to maintain the facilities a maintenance charge will be made, and if the company's poles are used to support circuits and fixtures, a pole rental charge will be made. All these charges will be based on actual costs to the company, Polhemus declared.

Railroads Inaugurate Store-Door Pick-Up and Delivery Freight Service

Inauguration of free store-door pick-up and delivery service on less-than-carload rail freight shipments being shipped to or arriving from trans-shipped points will become effective July 15, it was announced today by the freight traffic departments of all trans-continental railroads serving the Pacific Northwest.

This service has been established for local traffic for the past several years but this will be the first time in Pacific Northwest transportation history that the service has been offered for trans-continental shipments.

Under the new service shippers who have less-than-carloads shipments to send to eastern points may have their shipments picked up at their door for no extra charge, or if they are receiving shipments of this class from eastern points it will be delivered to their door at no additional expense.

Shippers who do not wish to take advantage of this service and continue to make their own arrangements for pick-up and delivery will be given a five-cents per hundred pound allowance, it was announced.
