Lloyd Johnson and Ha old Johnson left recently for San Francisco Francis Eaton of Eugene, formerly of Beaverton, visited here recently.

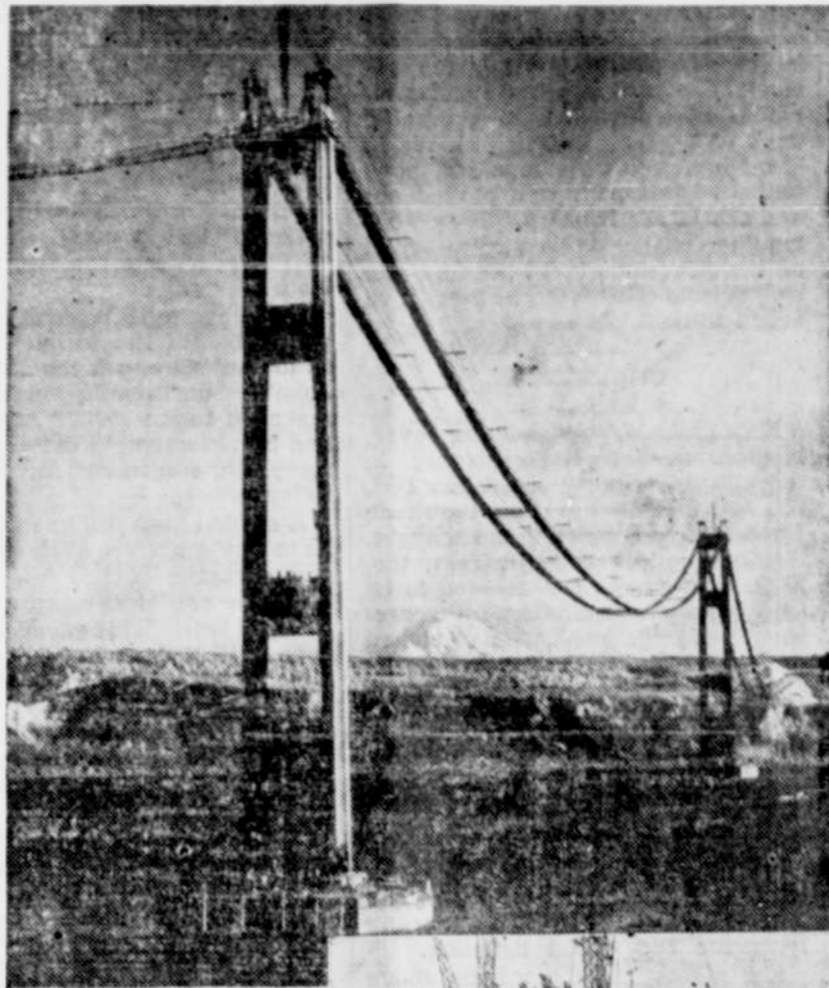

### Tacoma Narrows Bridge Nears Completion

One of the most important highway projects to 1940 tourists motoring to the Pacific Northwest is the new 5000-foot span under construction at Tacoma, Wash., over the mile-wide Narrows of Puget Sound to Kitsap Peninsula. This is the belief of Albert E. Horn, Jr., Northwest resident manager for the marketers of Mobilgas and Mobiloil.

Taking his figures from records of the Washington Toll Bridge Authority, Horn states that the completion of this structure, sometime in June, will throw open the third longest center suspension span in the world, and permit vehicular traffic to proceed for the first time over the waters of Washington state's famous inland sea.

Mastery of the serious engineering problems faced in the construction of the Pacific Coast's newest suspension bridge is considered by the Mobilgas executive to be an outstanding tribute to the personnel of the Toll Bridge Authority and the Engineering Board. Water depth at the main piers is 120 feet, and tides reach a velocity in excess of eight

miles an hour. To combat these conditions, the piers were sunk through the employment of false bottom floating caissons and elaborate anchoring and stabilizing provisions to insure their accurate location.

The two tower piers have a combined weight of 117,000 tons, and total weight on the piers is to be in excess of 15,000 tons. Shore anchorage weigh more than 52,000 tons. Greatest clearance above water is 195 feet. A 26-foot runway and five-foot walks on either side will accommodate traffic.

From a military standpoint, the new construction marvel will provide a short route from the big military reservation at Camp Lewis, and the new army air base at nearby McChord Field, to Bremerton and the Puget Sound Navy yard.

Economically, the Narrows bridge will make the southern tip of Kitsap Peninsula suburban to Tacoma, improve the value of real property in that area, and make the famed Olympic peninsula still more accessible to tourists and recreation hunters.

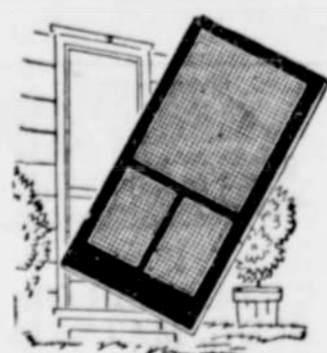
