County Welfare Carries Balance

Washington County Budget Shows \$10,473 Unspent at Completion of Last Year

Portland, Oregon, July 5—(Special)—Washington county's 1939 budget of \$81,650 for all public welfare purposes, had an unspent balance at end of last year of \$10,473.

The county's 1940 welfare budget of \$91,357 was 9.13% of all taxes levied in Washington county for this year, and was 20.96% of the 1940 taxes levied for county purposes only. The 1940 per capita cost of public welfare in Washington county was \$2.50 based on 1937 population estimate.

Thirty-five Oregon counties had a total of unspent public welfare budget allowance of \$310,224 as of December 31, 1939. Only one county, Marion, spent more for all public welfare than provided in its 1939 budget.

These figures were recently compiled for all counties in the state by Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc.

Total 1940 tax levy for all welfare purposes in all counties, including county farms and hospitals, indigent soldiers and sailors, also old age, blind, dependent, children and general (relief) assistance, was \$3,209,823 against \$3,200,001 levied by all counties for the same purposes in 1939, the tax organization's report indicates.

The principal reason why thirty-five of the thirty-six Oregon counties spent less for all public welfare in 1939 than was levied for those purposes, was inability of the state to match county tax levies with profits from the state liquor system. This inability of the state caused a slowing-down of aid to new public welfare applicants. The Oregon Business & Tax Research, Inc. statement points out that the \$310,224 unspent welfare budget balance at end of 1939 was not a cash but a bookkeeping balance. County millage tax levies might have been reduced by the unspent balance had the state's inability to match county taxes on property with liquor profits been foreseen when the 1939 county budget was prepared.

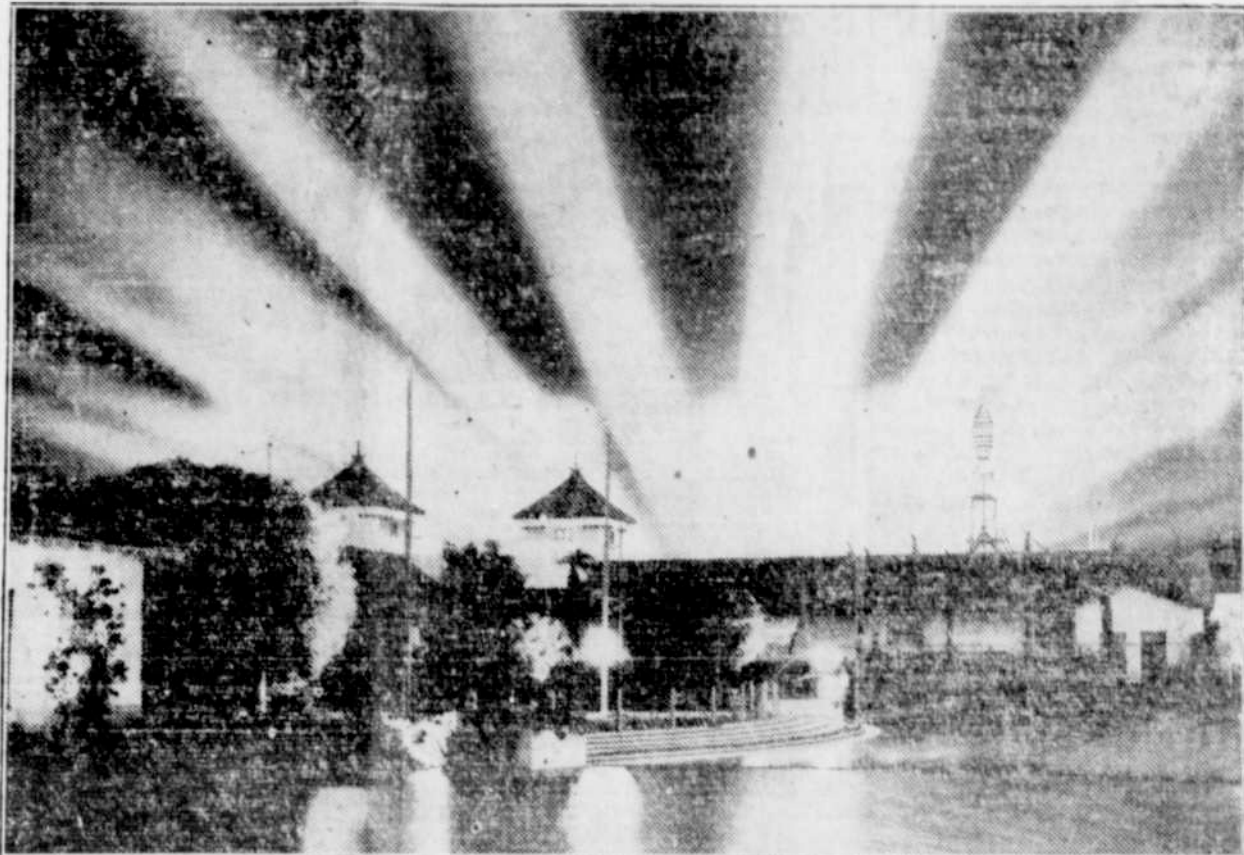

Lookout for The Graduates

Babson Says Youth Face Changed World and Opportunities

Disville Natch, N. H., July 5—America's mammoth educational mills have just thrown 2,000,000 school and college graduates on the doorsteps of industry. Already plagued by nearly 10,000,000 jobless, this new army of hopefuls adds further testimony to the fact that America must, as a vital part of our defense program, solve the unemployment problem. It is a new world that greets these 2,000,000 fledglings, a vastly different world than the textbooks just tucked away on the shelves told them about. But these newcomers into the battle of life are desperately needed in helping American realistically face her challenge in this world-wide revolution.

Profit Trend Down

Bluntly, graduates must recognize there are NOT the same opportunities for them that there were for their fathers and mothers. Jobs cannot pay so much in the future as they have in the past. For the first time in half a century the trend of the profits of American business is headed downward. The increased efficiency of our factories, machines and gadgets cannot offset the huge toll which defense expenditures will take.

For five decades, America's unsurpassed engineers constantly improved the efficiency of our industrial machine. This increased efficiency topped up sensational advances in government and labor costs. Machines have made it temporarily possible to work less, waste more, and yet enjoy a higher standard of living. Now, with government and labor costs still rising, increased efficiency of American factories and machines cannot hope to overcome the additional burdens of mammoth defense expenses as well.

Effect of a German Victory

With that point firmly fixed in mind, today's graduate should also weigh the effect of a German-controlled Europe on American economy. Bluntly, again, the truth here is that the United States is in the worst competitive position in history. Despite our efficient industrial methods, we are on the defensive in world markets because of our high salaries, high wages, high taxes and terrible waste. Moreover, political influence always follows economic influence. Germany, Japan and Italy will exploit this to the fullest extent, particularly in South America.

Individually controlled democratic American businesses will find themselves at the mercy of state-controlled Fascist cartels. Confident of victory, Germany has just offered steel, for instance, to South America for October delivery at a substantial reduction from our prices. She can dictate selling prices because she can dictate what she pays for wages and raw materials. This Nazi announcement sounds an ominous note not only for our economy, but for our security. Naturally, our export firms are frightened. Hence, the 1940 job-
