Wheat Payments For '40 Available

Acreage Allotments for Coming Year Soon to be Announced in County

Approximately one hundred wheat parity payments for 1940 were received at the county agricultural conservation office the past week, according to John W. Kamna, chairman of the county committee. These checks represent the ten cents per bushel parity payment for the farms which have a wheat acreage allotment.

Allotments are set for farms having recent wheat history and where wheat production is a part of their annual cropping program.

Payment forms are being mailed to the farm operators as rapidly as they are completed according to reports from the county committee. Members of the county committee, in addition to Kamna are A. E. Krahmer and R. Glen Ritchey.

Field compliance work for 1940 has been practically completed on those farms having wheat allotments or that grow Austrian field peas or hairy vetch, stated the committee. Also the wheat parity payments are made prior to the general conservation payments.

The first carload of 1940 Austrian field peas purchased by the Commodity Credit Corporation for the AAA moved out of Washington County the first of this week, according to the county committee. Shipments of the seed are to the southern cotton growing states. Growers eligible to sell these seeds through these agencies are those who have not exceeded their allotments and whose farms are listed under the agricultural conservation program.

To date, the yield of peas and vetch has been fairly satisfactory, says county agent Cyrus. Average yield are going to be somewhat less than was anticipated a month ago but apparently will be well above the unusually low average of 1939.

Announcement was made by the county committee that the wheat acreage allotments for 1941 will soon be announced. Every grower will receive official notice from the county office informing him of his wheat acreage allotment for 1941, the average yield set for the farm from the growers own record and his crop insurance rate for the 1941 crop. The figures in these notices are not arbitrarily set, says the county committee, but are taken from the producers record submitted in the compliance work that has been going on the past several years. Growers have the right to appeal and ask for adjustment when they feel that the allotted acreage and yields are not adequate for their farms and farming systems.

Secretary of State Earl Snell announced Monday the 1940 apportionment of \$2,000,000 in highway revenues to counties, of which \$800,000 will be distributed this month and \$1,200,000 in December. Multnomah County will receive \$617,923 and Washington county, \$72,639.

Reduce Interest Rate to Farmer

Land Bank Commissioner Loans Set at 3½ percent Thru Recent Legislation

Approximately \$82,000 will be saved by farmers of Columbia and Washington counties during the next two years as the result of reduced interest rates on most types of Federal Land Bank and Land Commissioner loans, Arthur M. S. Stook, Hillsboro, secretary-treasurer of National Farm Loan associations serving the counties, announced this week.

Legislation adopted recently by Congress fixes the interest rate on the next two years' installments on both loans, with some few exceptions, at 3½ per cent annually. Land Bank loans made since 1917 have been written at varying rates of interest, but average about 5 per cent. Land Bank Commissioner loans made since 1933 have been written at a 5 per cent rate.

The 3½ per cent rate on land bank loans, it was explained, is a continuation of a rate that has been in effect since 1933. The new rate on Commissioner loans trims another one-half of 1 per cent from the interest charge, a special rate of 4 per cent having been in effect on these loans for some time.

The Hillsboro National Farm Loan Association's office services approximately \$2,735,000 in Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans. The annual saving in Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon—the territory served by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane—will be in excess of \$2,000,000, Stook estimated.

United States Too Pessimistic

Babson Says Those Who Have the Jitters Should Visit Canada

Sherbrooke, Quebec, July 19—In view of the pessimism in the United States over the war, I came to Canada to find out how the Canadians feel. To my great joy, I find a far better feeling exists here than in the United States. Hence, my visit to Canada is very encouraging. Canadians absolutely spurn the story that the Queen of England and her children are now in Canada, or even contemplating coming over. They have complete faith in the British Empire's ability to beat off Hitler. Any reader who is discouraged about the war should go to Canada this summer for a vacation and get a new slant!

U. S. vs. Canadian Opinion

The people of the United States are divided into two groups. About 20 per cent really understand the seriousness of the present world events; but 80 per cent still look upon these tragic affairs as they would a football game. In Canada, however, it is just the other way around. Almost anyone you meet can talk intelligently of the European situation. They fully understand the momentous changes taking place abroad and the revolutionary results which they may bring about. This means that the Canadians are far better posted and have superior judgment concerning the war.

It, therefore, is very heartening to know that they have no fear that Great Britain will crack. It makes one very cheerful to talk with these Canadian people and see their faith that things will come out all right. This faith, moreover, is no blind hope, founded on Polly-Anna talk, but rather, it is a definite conclusion, based upon statistical evidence. There is no censorship of opinion. The newspapers and the people are free to criticize the Government and the conduct of the war. I happened to be in Canada the day the terrific increase in taxes was announced, yet I did not hear a whimper!

Government to Stay in London

When I suggested that it would seem wise to move the British Government from London to Ottawa, the answer came back, "Never! Never!" Canadians pointed out that for a thousand years London has been the center of the British Empire, that as long as London stands, the British Empire will hold together; but conversely, that to hold the British Empire together, the seat of government must remain in London or nearby. I could not find out to what extent the collapse of France will cut down the number of men that Canada will send across. Of course, England will want all the pilots that Canada can send.
