Mrs. Luther Spicer of Pueblo, Colo., is visiting her brother and sister-in-law Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bear.

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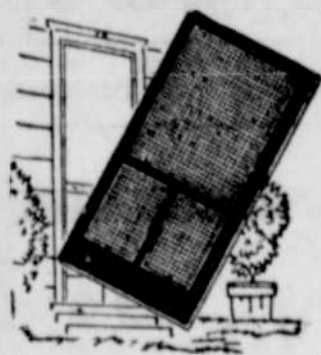


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KINTON
