Weavers to Work During Fair Week

Women who like to weave will get their share of education and entertainment at the state fair in Salem, September 2-8, for the textile department will present a special feature in weaving for the seven days of the fair. Each day seven looms will be in operation.

This working exhibit will be furnished by Clarence Veal of Albany, C. W. Ganzemiller of Oak Grove, the Allied Arts society of Portland and the Salem Art Center.

Other special non-competitive exhibits in the textile division at the fair will be the Indian native crafts arranged by Jack Anderson, U. S. Indian field Service, assisted by girls from the Chemawa Indian school, and the exhibits of craft work done by Oregon women in rural camps held annually. These latter crafts will include metal art, weaving and pottery, with this display directed by Azalea Sager, director of extension service at the state college. Corvallis Assisting her will be Miss Lois Lutz, home furnishing specialist, and Miss Lucy Lane, clothing specialist at the college.

Newberg College to Start 50th Year September 16
