A That there should be no schism in the body; but that the members should have the same care one for another. 1 Cor. 12:25.

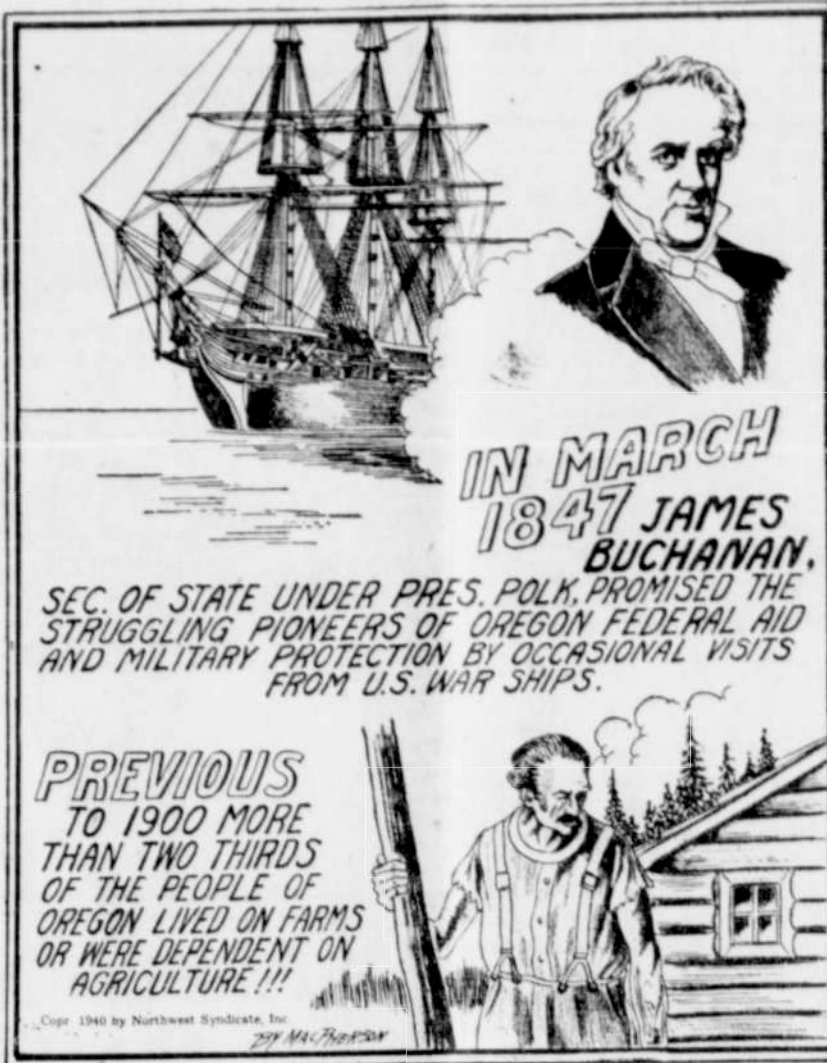
4 If the church is one, as the body of Christ, what should be its united aim?

Homemakers Receive Valuable Instruction At Recent Camp Session

"Is that a toadstool or a mushroom? How can you tell the difference between a fir and a hemlock? These and many other questions pertaining to nature study were asked by fifty-two homemakers of Washington and Clackamas Counties who attended a four-day camp at the Silver Creek Recreational Area under the direction of the Home Economics Extension service of Oregon State college. Mr. Cecil Buckley, supervisor of the park area, guided the study of leaves, trees, flowers, birds, and animals found in the park area.

Outstanding events of the four-day camp were the 4 mile hike around the Silver Creek Falls State Park trail, made by 35 of the 52 women on Wednesday morning; a brief sketch of new biography, travel, humor, fiction, and drama books by Miss Harriet Long of the State Library; a vesper service each evening in a sheltered outdoor nook with the aid of a portable organ; travel talk and singing around the campfire; a picnic lunch in the state park; a planked salmon dinner served around the campfire; construction of articles of basketry, needlepoint, and textile pictures.

This camp, the last in a series of four homemakers' camps at the same site, was directed by Miss Hazel Packard, Multnomah County Home Demonstration Agent. Kathleen McCrae, Washington County Home Demonstration Agent assisted the director Mildred Johnson of Boring directed group activities; Miss Olive Banks of Silverton was swimming instructor; Mrs. Nana Andersen of Troutdale was basketry instructor; Heien Morgan of Gaston was camp "sheriff."

The oldest camper in the group was 73 years old; the youngest was 23 years old.

This is the sixth annual camp for Clackamas county women and the first since 1936 for Washington County women, according to Kathleen McCrae, Home Demonstration Agent.

Members of National Youth Administration camps in Oregon have won high praise for excellent work in helping fight forest fires in the state this season.

Southern Pacific Add Considerable Equipment

Orders for \$350 new freight cars were placed Wednesday by the Southern Pacific company.

At the same time the company announced it would build 190 additional new cars in its own shops.

Altogether the new freight cars will represent an investment of about \$7,750,000.

Included in the orders were 1500 box cars to cost approximately \$4,250,000; 500 large automobile cars at a cost of about \$1,800,000; 350 hopper cars at a cost of \$1,000,000.

New cars to be built in Southern Pacific's shops include 125 flat cars and 15 dro-end gondolas both types being of 70-ton capacity and 50 new steel cabooses.

Earlier in the week the company announced placing of orders for 20 streamlined locomotives for passenger service calling for an expenditure of \$3,500,000. These will be slightly heavier and more powerful than others of the same type now in the company's service. Deliveries are expected to start toward the end of the year.

ber although we get some from Africa, and some from Brazil. So Japan is hiking our bid of an embargo on scrap iron and oil by getting set to pounce on the Dutch East Indies.

Of course, President Roosevelt says it isn't an embargo. It is only a licensing system,—but as exporter here in San Francisco say, "Try to get a license!" The license order does not say who it is aimed at, but exporters will tell you how quickly your application will get all snarled up in red tape if it is for permission to ship to Japan. This is a serious blow to Japan because she depends on our scrap iron and oil to build and fuel her growing war machine. We supply her with 70 to 90 per cent respectively of these materials.

Chemists Better Than Soldiers.
Moreover, she depends on us to pay for her imports of scrap and oil thru our gigantic purchases of silk. This end of the business does not look so good for the Japanese either. Japan really fears American chemistry rather than American diplomacy. Nylon is beginning to take the place of silk in women's hosiery. It already has taken over 10 per cent of the market! Cutting off our silk purchases can be a mortal wound to Japan because, license system or no license system, the foreign exchange necessary to purchase American scrap and oil would put a tremendous load on her already overstrained financial system.

To Shoot the Works?
It is evident, therefore, that the Japanese may, sooner or later, be forced to "shoot the works"—that is to risk war with Britain and the United States. Many a foreign observer believes we should beat her to the punch by starting now while she is embroiled in China, while Britain can help us, while Russia is still a menace to the Nipponese. At any rate, the fuel for a first-class U. S. Japanese embargo is all there. Only thing lacking is the spark to set it off—and many a Coast resident is fearful that spontaneous combustion may start it.

Meanwhile, the oil and scrap restrictions have hit U. S. business here on the coast harder than anywhere else. Japan has been taking over 60,000 barrels of oil per day—most of which is cleared through Los Angeles! While small as compared with national crude oil output, it bulked big in relation to California's already severely prorated output of 560,000 barrels daily. Shippers are not hurt by the oil restrictions because most of it sailed in Nipponese tankers. Scrap restrictions cut just so much more into the bustle and hustle here on San Francisco's docks and freighters, already held down by the war and other fetters.

License Policy Okay
I am, however, all for the embargo license system or whatever you call it. I believe that the Japanese are as big a menace to us as the Nazis, and I am 100 per cent in favor of doing everything we can, short of war, to prevent them from going too far. If, however, war is inevitable, perhaps it had better come now than when the entire Axis group of nations are ready to put the screws on us. On the other hand, it seems as if, with all these nations worshipping the same God, there should be some way to settle these great problems without resort to war. Sometime Britain, Germany, Japan and the United States MUST sit around a conference table and settle things. Why not do it now?

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
