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Wallace Wrong Again!

Democratic Vice-Presidential Candidate Henry Wallace in his acceptance speech asserted that during the seven years that President Roosevelt has been in office farm incomes "have been more than doubled." Like so many New Deal statements, that one simply is not true.

Figures supplied by the United States Agricultural Department show that cash income from farm marketings in 1933, the year in which Mr. Roosevelt became President, totaled \$5,278,000,000 and that in 1939, the last full year for which we have a report, they were \$7,625,000,000. This is an increase, to be sure, but it is NOT MORE THAN DOUBLE.

Of course, it is never fair to compare one year against another unless account is taken of all circumstances. A fair basis of comparison is that of the full seven years of the New Deal and the seven previous years. What does that show in the case of farm income?

Cash farm income for the seven Republican years preceding the New Deal—including the worst years of the depression—averaged \$9,046,000,000 a year. The average annual total for the New Deal seven-year period was \$7,247,000,000. Annual average income per farm for the 1926-32 period was \$1,432 compared with \$1,062 for the 1933-39 period. Average annual income per farm per acre for the Republican period was \$298 compared with \$228 for the New Deal years. The figures for the New Deal years include benefit payments from the Federal Government.

It is no wonder Henry Wallace devoted most of his speech to the foreign situation!

New Deal Drops in Exports

In the depression year of 1932 exports of American products had a value of \$752,000,000. In 1939 agricultural exports had a value of \$683,000,000.

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Portland District PUD Issue Off in November

There will be no public power issue on the November 5 ballot, it was assured Friday when Harry M. Kenin, chairman of the Bonneville-for-Portland committee, announced that the proposal for another vote on a people's utility district for Portland had been dropped.

The committee, which sponsored a PUD vote in the May primary and lost, had obtained forms from the hydroelectric commission and had only to request another vote to place the PUD on the ballot again.

Proponents of public power recently petitioned the city council for a November vote on a proposal for municipal ownership, but the council refused. It is too late to obtain such a vote by circulating petitions.

New Family Life Radio Series Slated by KOAC

The eleventh annual series of radio club programs on family life has just been announced by KOAC, the state-owned station operated by the general extension division at Oregon State College. This year's series will start October 8 and will deal with Our Changing Family Life.
