

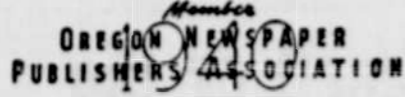

It was the theory of HOLC and a lot of other new government bureaus that they would add to the "security" of the average citizen. But just look at the HOLC, for example. It has disclosed that in its Oklahoma area alone, it has lost \$5,178,000 on homes on which it had to foreclose.

The government also has had to foreclose on 32,000 farms.

Furthermore, this new trend should help the credit of smaller independent concerns. Banks and investors are hipped on "blue-chips". They think loans should be made only to big companies and shares purchased only in the biggest of these. Perhaps banks and investors have a surprise ahead.

I visualize a new form of banking. New investment companies as distinct from existing banks will not accept deposits (which are really an indebtedness payable before the stockholders can liquidate a penny), but will loan their share capital directly to small concerns and carefully watch them. Such companies could keep out of declining industries and gradually get into growing industries. The stock in these new investment companies should furnish investors excellent diversification and a good safe income. The main difficulty now with securities of small concerns is their thin market. They are hard to sell in an emergency.

One Final Thought

The importance of small concerns and the dangers of big concerns is not new. It has been discussed by philosophers and economists for the past 3,000 years. Only last night I was reading the first two chapters of Ecclesiastes—written 2,500 years ago. The writer was a captain of industry and the leading banker and investor of his time. He presents still another side of this whole question. Yes, I am bullish on properly run small concerns in growing industries. The pendulum is about to swing in their favor.

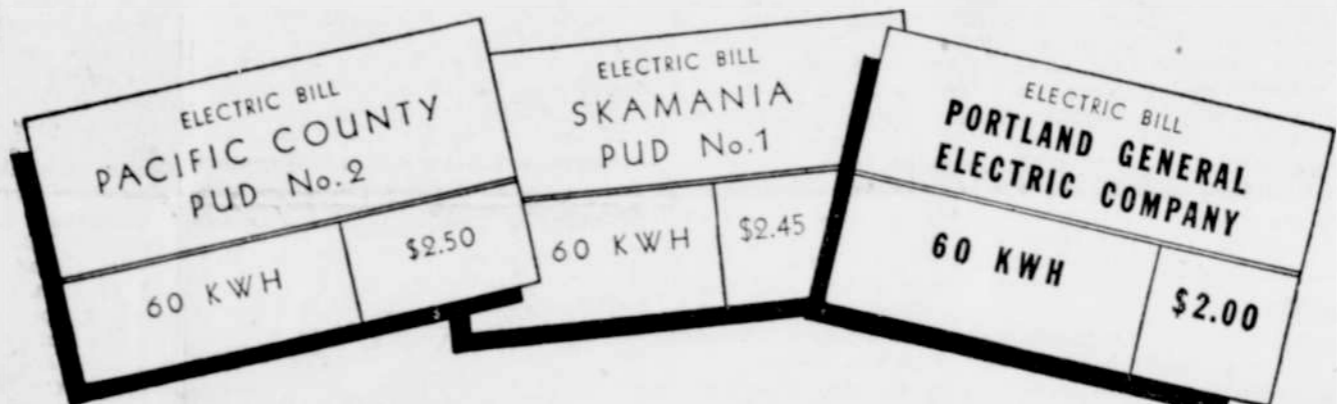

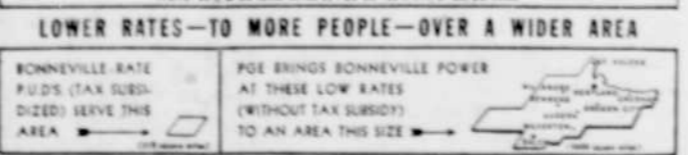
