Leslie Scott Pioneer of Oregon Candidate for State Treasurer Job

Leslie M. Scott, Republican candidate for state treasurer, has made a notable name for himself as a journalist, historian, executive and civic leader. The large primary vote by which he was nominated indicates the esteem in which he is held by the people of Oregon.

Mr. Scott's father, the late Harvey W. Scott, was the great pioneer editor of the Oregonian, but the son never traded on the distinguished family's name, rolling up an impressive record of achievement in his own right.

He is the author of History of the Oregon Country a work which stands as an impressive tribute to his scholarship. Few men know every nook and cranny of Oregon, his native state, as well as Mr. Scott.

Mr. Scott's executive and financial ability has found an outlet, also, as a director and treasurer of the Oregon Historical Society, and as chair-

How big an appetite does a PUD have when it crowds up to the tax trough—and begins feeding on your dollars? If you want to find out, just read what has happened in other Oregon and Washington counties where PUDs have been organized.

\$40,564 Legal Fees, Traveling, Etc.!

Pacific County PUD collected \$40,564 in taxes before it spent a dime for electric properties. Most of this fund went for legal fees and traveling expenses of the three commissioners. It paid \$489,000 for electric properties but floated \$690,000 in bonds; and an additional \$35,000 in bonds has been authorized, or \$234,000 in excess of the purchase price of the electric properties.

\$79,000 Bonds for \$40,000 Property.

Skamania County PUD paid \$40,000 for electric properties—but floated a \$79,000 bond issue. Further, it collected a full 2 mill tax on all properties in the district. Despite this large tax subsidy plus "at-site" purchases of Bonneville power, Skamania PUD rates are higher for the average family than present PGE rates.

PUD Tax \$10 Per Customer.

Wahkiakum County PUD has collected funds from taxpayers amounting to \$11,089—more than \$10 per each electric customer in the county.

Nothing to Show for \$7,644.73 New Taxes.

For seven years the Tillamook PUD has been spending taxpayers' money (total, \$7,644.73)—but it still has no utility property. Now PUD directors are asking voters to approve a \$750,000 bond issue.

\$250,000 Rake-Off Looms for Fiscal Agent.

Clark County PUD is squeezing \$41,000 from the taxpayers this year—spending it for attorneys, engineers, etc. It has signed an agreement to pay a fiscal agent up to \$250,000 if he effects the sale of private property to the district. The PUD does not own or operate any utility property.

\$91,548 for Lawyers Fees, Engineers, Etc.

Cowlitz County PUD has collected \$91,548 in general property taxes and has spent most of it "investigating". It still owns no electric property.

\$508,000 of "Water."

Grays Harbor PUD paid \$2,842,000 for electric properties, but floated a \$3,350,000 bond issue for the deal—leaving \$508,000 of "water". On top of this, the PUD gobbled \$44,204 in taxes this year, and earmarked \$103,000 of bond money "to provide for engineering, fiscal, legal and other fees and expenses incident to the acquisition of these properties."

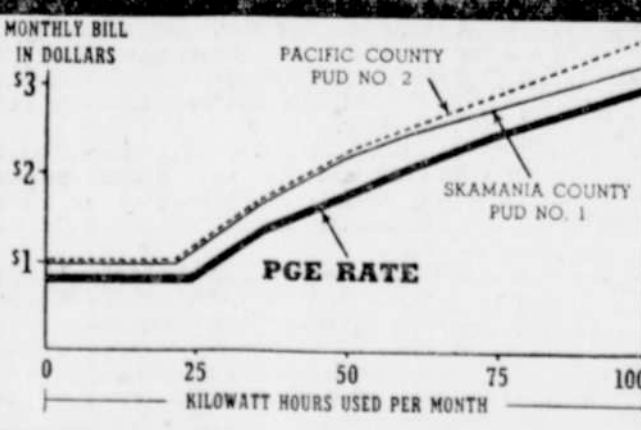
