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tion under Fascism, money, as we have known it, is not needed. But I must not slip into that very interesting field of what is happening to the European money situation and to the Rothschilds as this column is about famine.

There may be a severe food shortage in the winter of 1941-1942 if the British blockade is then in effect. If vitamins thru the loss of fruits, leafy vegetables, and dairy products, this would develop scurvy, eye diseases, and lung infections among the weaker people. But the writer of 1941-42 is a long way ahead. Besides the Germans are making tests feed-

ing people on common grass—very rich in vitamins—which may have revolutionary results.

How Will the War End?
Whatever food statistics show, let us remember that, in the end, the war will be decided by feelings rather than by figures. Whatever our nationality, we have spiritual obligations to all nations. In the sight of God, we are still brothers whether Americans, Germans, English, Italians, or Japanese. Therefore, let us consider the following:

1. It may take one or more years, but Germany can continue to drop bombs until England is laid waste.
2. It may take one or more years, but Great Britain can continue to blockade Europe until millions die from famine.
3. Either America or Russia will some time be able to be a great factor in bringing about peace by offering food, clothing, shelter, and other necessities to the peoples of both England and Europe.

Who shall finally hold out the helping hand to those stricken peoples? Shall it be Christian America or atheistic Russia? Shall it be Democracy or Communism? The time for such profound help has not yet come. Conditions are not yet bad enough; but they can be bad enough some time, perhaps by 1942.

It, therefore, seems to me that—as part of our defense program—we should (1) Publicly make a survey of England's and Europe's needs, revising this from month to month; (2) Begin now to store in huge quantities later to be needed supplies; (3) Constantly tell the peoples of both Great Britain and Europe that when their leaders will sit about a conference table and settle their difficulties, we will give them these needed commodities.

I believe in our present defense program; but I also know that one dollar spent on the above three-feature plan would do as much to shorten the war as five dollars spent on new battleships and the training of millions of men.

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Claims Present Milk Law Eliminates Much Trouble To Producer and Consumer

C. W. Jerome, manager, Oregon Milk Producers, who are opposing the repeal of the Oregon Milk Law, points out the many advantages, endorsements and equity of Oregon's Milk Act which became a part of Oregon's basic law under the administration of the late Governor Julius L. Meier and since then has been upheld by three Governors Martin and Sprague, three Legislatures, and by the Supreme Court of the State, as an Act definitely in the public interest.

The Oregon Milk Law is a vehicle by means of which the orderly marketing of fresh fluid milk is accomplished in the large centers of population of the State.

Since the milk Act went into effect there have been no ladelling of bulk milk in unclean, dusty containers, short weights, and low quality. Many states have undertaken to copy the Oregon Milk Law in new legislation or benefit from its carefully drawn provisions through amendments to existing and less carefully drawn laws in their own borders. Organized labor has endorsed the law and supported its just and fair administration under three Boards.

The Oregon State Grange as a body, and through its progressive leaders, including Ray Gill, Master of the State Grange, has upheld and endorsed the law.

Under the Oregon Milk Law, Jerome says, the consumer is getting quality as high as that of any city in the country at a price lower than in many comparable cities, 1½¢ lower than the national average, and as low as in any major city on the Pacific Coast. At the same time the producer today is getting nearly 5% more out of the milk dollar than he was getting before the milk law was enacted. He further cites the pre-milk law record of troubles which took the form of discrimination, inequitable prices to producers, and general chaotic conditions, as being indicative of what might be expected if the Milk Law was repealed.
