Drawn for Board
No. 1 Listed Below

America chose Tuesday by free democracy of lottery, the order in which young men shall be called to the colors.

Capsules, each containing a number, were drawn from an ancient gold fish bowl on the stage of a Washington government auditorium, thus determining the progressiveness in which conscript registrants shall be called for a year's army service.

The first number drawn was 158, picked from the bowl by Secretary of War, Henry L. Stimson, his eyes blindfolded with a strip of linen.

Men, whose draft order number were called need not worry about reporting to the draft board at once, the board will send out questionnaires to all draftees as soon as the official master list is received from Washington.

The questionnaire which will be received through the mail must be answered within five days and sent back to the board. The draftee will then be notified of his classification. If he objects he can appeal. There are 8 pages in the questionnaire, after classification he will be called according to classification and draft order number.

Governor Sprague Monday appointed 57 attorneys to be government appeal agents that will give registrants advice on how to fill out questionnaires. The board will be divided into 17 judicial districts. Each district board will name for its chairman the senior judge or presiding judge of that district.

P. L. Patterson, board No. 1, and J. R. McCready, board No. 2 attorneys at law, have been named for the two boards in Washington county.

The local boards cannot help on filling out questionnaires.

Roosevelt Unyielding
Battle for the Cause
Says Central CommitteeDemocratic State Central Committee
of Oregon

If President Roosevelt had agreed to abandon his social program any time during the past seven years, the opposition to him today would be hardly more than a whisper.

If the President had submitted to the complete demands of John L. Lewis, the CIO leader would not be attempting to swing his rank and file away from the New Deal.

To conceal their real purposes the Republicans have set up a convenient smoke-screen of catch phrases about defending the Constitution, protecting the American way of life, and the need for returning to economy principles. The actual target of the assault is the program of laws which the Roosevelt administration has enacted to safeguard the interests of the workers, the farmers and the unemployed.

In his excellent address to the International Teamsters union, President Roosevelt put his fingers on the sore spot fairly and squarely and labor leaders in the audience knew what he was talking about. He simply recalled the mean, under-cover, last-minute campaign which the Republicans waged against the social security law in 1936. You recall the silly tales about employees being forced to wear "dog tags" around their necks in lieu of identification cards.

Wendell Willkie may be sincere in endorsing some of the Democratic reforms, but he has never in his life been identified with the great crusade for social reform.

Despite the opposition clamor, and no matter what the pretext, President Roosevelt refuses to yield an inch in battling for the cause.

"It is my hope," he said, "that soon the United States will have a national system under which no needy man or woman within our borders will lack a minimum old-age pension that will provide adequate food, adequate clothing and adequate lodging to the end of the road without having to go to the poorhouse to get it."

"Facts On the
PUD Scheme"Washington County Club
Present Various Phases
Pertaining to Measure

Red has been used to warn against danger for so long that the psychological effect of seeing this color is to put us on our guard against impending disaster. The P.G.E. recognizing this fact are using it in their advertising, hoping in this way to scare the unsuspecting VOTER into voting against his own interest, but the voter will refuse to be scared.

An old trick often practiced by dishonest lawyers and politicians is to ask questions in such a way as to imply nonexistent facts as an answer. The questions on the front page of the P.G.E. circular entitled "FACTS ON THE P.U.D. SCHEME" are intended to divert your attention from the real issue of this UTILITY campaign as the following will prove.

On page 2 of the circular—

RISK NO. 1—TRUTH—This measure does create a new tax levying body. TRUTH—(Not mentioned by P.G.E.) The power to levy taxes is limited by Oregon PUD Law, sec. 56-3434, "the board may levy and collect, or cause to be levied and collected, taxes for a period of ten years, but not to exceed two mills in any one year nor more than ten mills in said ten-year period, for the purpose of paying the obligations of the district."

(See comment on Tillamook PUD). This means that on \$1,000 assessed valuation they cannot levy more than a total of \$10 taxes in ten years and it will require 1,000 years for this tax to eat up your property. Each director of the district will be a citizen and taxpayer in our county and will not levy an unnecessary tax against his own property. The estimated \$1,655,000 in bonds WILL NOT be paid in taxes on property.

RISK NO. 2—TRUTH—If necessary to pay the obligations of the district the directors can levy taxes amounting to \$44,924 each year for five years or a total of \$224,624 for ten years, but this will never be necessary as is proven by experience. (See Tillamook County.) The P.G.E. has used large figures in order to confuse you. What would it mean to you as an individual? (See answer in RISK NO. 1 above.)

RISK NO. 3—Oregon PUD Law, sec. 56-3458. "Prior to the completion or construction of a utility, as herein defined, no contract, either expressed or implied, involving an obligation on the part of the district in excess of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) shall become binding until approved by the commission, and it shall be unlawful for the board to make any payment under such contract until same has been approved. This section limits the directors power to spend. The directors can cut off their noses, they can burn their houses and barns, but they will not, neither will they foolishly spend taxes collected from themselves. This RISK presupposes the PUD commissioners to be a gang of crooks and asks us to have perfect confidence in the P.G.E. management.

"RISK NO. 4"—All sponsors and candidates for directors of the PUD are unanimously opposed to issuing general obligation bonds, and the public would not approve of these bonds. Therefore the levying of taxes for anything except as mentioned in "RISK NO. 1" is impossible. Oregon PUD Law, sec. 56-3444. "Before any district shall issue any general obligation or any revenue bonds, the question whether such bonds of said district shall be issued shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the district, either at any general state or county election or at a special election called for that purpose by the board of said district. Notice of such election shall be given as herein provided. At such election the ballots shall contain a statement of the amount of bonds to be voted on and the purpose for which such bonds are to be used."

"RISK NO. 5"—The PUD will be an honest organization and when the interest and principle payments are met the bond holders have nothing to say. The operating expenses, interest and amortization of bonded indebtedness are all covered in the Bonneville Standard Rate.

"RISK NO. 6"—Oregon PUD Law, sec. 56-3461. "All property, real and personal, owned, used, operated or controlled by any peoples' utility district, in or for the production, transmission, distribution or furnishing of electric power or energy or electric service for or to the public, shall be assessed and taxed in the same manner and for the same purposes, and such district and the directors and officers thereof shall be subject to the same requirements, as may now or hereafter be provided by law in respect to the assessment and taxation of similar property owned, used, operated or controlled by private corporations or individuals for the

War and
ProsperityBabson Says
Prosperity is the
Best Defense

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 1—I have said in recent articles that business is getting better. As long as the defense program continues to broaden there will be no lessening of activity. Year-end reports will show more plus than minus signs. Manufacturers and other business men are throwing away the red ink bottles and stocking up on black. It takes time for war production to get under way. The country is still in the inertia stage. Once the initial problems of planning, financing, and production are overcome, things should move fast.

Don't Be Impatient

With machine tool companies working day and night to provide the necessary equipment, there is a scarcity of skilled labor. Men must be trained for many important and technically-skilled jobs. Blueprints must be drawn, sources of supplies arranged, transportation schedules by rail and highway checked. Lawyers must study contracts, prices be determined, and bank loans negotiated. Our industrial areas are coming to a state of intense activity.

The great agricultural sections of the country have not yet felt the increased tempo of our industrial cities. However, as movement of the business cycle swings from East to West, all sections of our land will ultimately be caught up in this rush to arms. Young and old, rich and poor, will all take more of a part in whatever the future holds.

Business Will Improve

War prosperity for some people is a delightful state to contemplate. Unfortunately, such people do not come in contact with the actualities of war. These are far more cruel than those of the last conflict. My business associates know that I never side-step a scrap. I thrive on trouble. Give me some new upset to face each day and I am a happy man. I am no pacifist in business, religion or war; and am all set for any actual participation in the current fight abroad. But I also know that when our enemies suffer we also suffer in the end.

Dividends may increase, but total incomes of business men and investors will be drastically reduced by taxes. Even war talk and a feeling that the right side is winning brings increased activity in the stock market. The demand for labor puts more money into the pockets of the man on Main Street and into the tills of stores. Only unbiased historians years hence will be able to judge whether or not war ever provide lasting economic values. Surely, real prosperity can come from our present situation only as it strengthens our character and teaches us needed lessons.

Let's Remember 1929

Unfortunately, we have not yet recovered from the effects of the last war. Furthermore, fundamentally, we profited little from it, either financially or spiritually. We had a slump in business after the armistice, followed by several years of rising values. Then came the swift kick in the pants so many of us remember. Now, we are on the eve of another great outbreak. God grant that it will not come before we are prepared.

Our country is like a sick child who before recovering from an ear-ache breaks out with chicken pox. We are not yet out of the depression starting in 1929. Temporarily, the economic situation will ease up, bringing us to a false sense of security and prosperity. Geographically our country is so large, and our numbers and resources so great, that many have the impression we cannot be licked. However, in Hitler's eyes we are already tottering from internal labor troubles and Congressional fights. And the thought may not be far fetched.

Prosperity Best Defense

Germany now has the great bulk of the resources of the Continent, let alone the Scandinavian countries. With this backing, anything can happen to us economically. One saving grace is that in all history no man has yet conquered the world. If I have learned anything in the last forty years, it concerns man's frailty. Some day a leader will rise in some country who will be Hitler's match. Until then, we must keep prepared economically as well as militarily for whichever way the tide turns.

I may sound like an alarmist. If so, forgive me. I am anxious only that we Americans are not caught sleeping, economically, at the switch. I am hopeful, too, that all will realize the price our young people must some day pay for the present expenditures and brief respites from unemployment. Hitler has no idea of invading the United States as long as our people are prosperous. He, however, believes, that through labor and political dissensions, unemployment will be so great and our

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
